'd like to start by welcoming Ian Allinson and his rejuvenated St. Alban's side for our last home game of the season. Their current form would make them Championship contenders and their fantastic run now looks likely to help them avoid the drop when two months ago it looked pretty dodgy. Full credit to goes to everyone at the club but in light of this form, they must be scratching their heads as to how they got themselves down there in the first place.

As for us, this undoubtedly ranks as my most difficult season ever and I must confess, I have not really enjoyed it. Nevertheless, despite all the problems, we have battled through and will probably finish just below half way. Add that to our FA Cup run. I suppose it's not all bad, but I still believe it has been an underachievement.

To be successful in the National South I now believe you need to be big, strong and effective. Sutton typified what's necessary to win this league, but it has taken them 5 years since winning the Ryman and had an excellent all weather pitch laid which I'm sure has been another big influence on their success. They have also got a millionaire as their manager!

This is a difficult league with very small margins between success and failure but just look at play off chasing Maidenhead and Hemel. We've drawn all 4 games against them in recent weeks and there has been very little between us. When you consider we've

been fighting relegation, it's amazing that only 4 teams in the league have lost fewer matches than us this season.

We are still learning about this level but I honestly maintain we have not been too far away and we will continue to strive to establish ourselves in the National South next season. When you look at some of the Ryman clubs brief encounters in this league like Tonbridge, Billericay, Staines, Hornchurch and Bognor, you know how difficult it is and this is proving the same for our fellow promoted team Lowestoft in National North this season. We are still there and ready to go again!

When you listen to fans and TV pundits. you constantly hear the comments hard work. commitment, character, attitude, desire, commitment, passion and the ability to play for the shirt. All things you expect from your team and add that to decision making and you are half way to success. The old saying of 'hard work beats talent, when talent doesn't work hard' rings true with many teams nowadays, just look at Leicester. Technically they are not the best team in the Premier, but their spirit and work ethic sends out an important message to all teams. Our inconsistency this year has not been about our ability, but I'm afraid our application at times has needed to be better and it will improve next season.

Anyone at the AGM about a month ago will certainly know it made depressing

listening. We were told the financial situation was pretty dire and we needed to trim the wages and it was likely that the budget would be cut significantly next season. Exactly what you need to hear in the middle of a relegation battle! Well, we achieved the first bit and now we have to address the current shortfall for next season. The 100/400 has had a good initial response and I want to make a personal plea to make a big push before pre- season to give us that fighting chance of giving you something positive to get excited about on the pitch.

Collectively, we have taken this club a long way within the financial constraints over the years and we have still achieved against all the odds. I really feel this could be an exciting and positive time and a possibility we may even be able to start competing on a level playing field. This summer could well see us securing a new lease, appointing a new chairman and CEO and if we can bridge the financial gap, just maybe there won't be a budget cut!!! Now that would be music to my ears!

The management have already sat down with their thoughts about pre-season games and arrangements, along with player recruitment. Making contact with all the pro clubs, deciding on the players you want, then the players you can afford, do we gamble on youngsters or on players from lower level all come into the thinking. You are bound to get one or two wrong and some will take

longer than others, but when you look at Tom Pett, Jerome Okimo and Josh Urguart, it proves it's a worthwhile exercise. Wouldn't it be nice if we could also pick up a couple of old pro's such as Glen Little and Scotty who made such an impact with their experience and guile in our promotion winning team. The influence both on and off the pitch were invaluable. As usual, finance will be the major influence on who we can sign.

Despite my long term relationship with this club, I still struggle to understand the negativity around the place and can't believe why so many continuously want to knock the club we support. We have punched above our weight for years and continue to make progress on and off the pitch. One example is early season criticism for our poor scoring record and highlighted again after our 3 recent failures to score and yet we have scored more than two teams in top 5. Win and we will get 2 pages on the forum, lose and we get 6 or 7. Amazing!

I totally agree that it has not been great, but we continue to strive to get better and it's so much easier for everyone when we all pull in the same direction and work in a positive environment. Maybe some people could make that a new seasons resolution!

My sincere thanks go to our management team of Leo, Scotty, Gilly, Mick and Jason, along with physics Gary, Chris and James who have continued to give me fantastic commitment once again this year. I cannot thank you all enough for your loyalty and support especially through some of the difficult decisions and testing times this season. My gratitude goes to the whole squad who have given us another season at this level. an enjoyable FA Cup run and some very big highs over the last nine months.

Finally, on behalf of all the management and players, I would like to thank everyone else involved within the club for their hard work and commitment throughout the season. Enjoy the summer and let's come back refreshed and set our targets well above what we have

Let's hope we can finish on a high in the final league game and go on to enjoy a great presentation evening in the club tonight.



ROYAL BILLE HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE? STONES V THE SAINTS

48 years ago, over 5,000 saw Saints edge an FA **Cup thriller**

EALDSTONE generally held the upper hand over the Saints during the 1960s Isthmian League years although our visitors were a formidable force at the end of that decade under mercurial boss Sid Prosser.

His side came so close to achieving immortality in the 1968 FA Cup when. having progressed through four qualifying rounds, St Albans were drawn against the Stones at Lower Mead in the 1st Round Proper. The game finished 1-1 and in a tense Tuesday night replay at Clarence Park a solitary Dave Neville goal saw the Stones fans troop home despondent... and the Saints through to a home 2nd Round tie with Walsall.

And they were just five minutes away from claiming their first Football League scalp in 44 years when Walsall grabbed a late leveller. In the Monday morning Third Round draw City for Walsall) came out of the hat with Tottenham Hotspur - but the Saints dreams died as Walsall won the replay 3-1 in front of 10,626 at Fellows Park.

Prosser, of course, later jumped ship from the Saints and worked his magic at the Stones for two glorious years in the early 70s, helping the club climb into the Southern League Premier Division before leaving us, in turn, for Chelmsford City. A clever manager who never quite achieved greatness.



THIS was the season we were relegated from the Conference National, and to be honest at the time it didn't seem so cataclysmic: The Stones had been relegated from the Conference to the Southern League before (in 1981) but had bounced straight back.

And although it had been a wretched season, new(ish) manager Tony Jennings and his revamped squad had shown enough ability in the final few games to give the fans confidence that we'd be back pretty damned quick.

Of course, it didn't quite work out like that. Fast forward four years and we had lost our ground, entered into a disastrous groundshare with Watford and been relegated through the Southern Prem into the First Division. Fast forward another three years and the club was on its knees, taking voluntary relegation to the Ryman Div Three before the long climb back began. That's our story, and a remarkable

one it has been too with the Stones now just one promotion away from returning to non-League's top flight.

Who could have foreseen this story 28 years ago? Goals from Greg Zachariah and Tommy English (the former Coventry City pro) were enough to beat a limited Fisher side who finished their first season at that heady level in 16th place. And the Surrey side's tale is almost as extraordinary as ours as

rolled by some dubious characters who managed to beat the groundgrading deadline by minutes in the summer of '87 - and then subsided quietly back to anonymity in the pace of three years.

Fisher - named after the Catholic martyr Saint John Fisher - were wound up with enormous debts in 2009 but are now now playing as Fisher FC in the Kent League.

IMMY started his career in Sheffield and Rotherham and joined Wealdstone from Arlesey Town having moved South. Primarily a solid central defender, he made over 100 starts for the club over 4 seasons with a dozen appearances off the bench scoring 11 goals with quite a few of those can in 18 starts as a centre forward.

Following Wealdstone, he moved onto continue playing before moving into management at St Albans. to get back Having resigned earlier this season, he's kept up his fitness and dusted off the boots once more, now playing for Berkhamsted Town...

What's the day job, Jim? My day job is quite simple in comparison to management. If someone says 'Wealdstone' what's your first thought?

You joined the club in 2007 and were a big part of the side for three years - what first brought you to the club and where had you been previously?

I think I spoke to Gordon on the phone at the same time as he

was having a conversation with a lad I was working with called Ben Martin - it was while I was playing at Arlesey Town in the league below I think. I hadn't that long moved down from the North so I was basically just playing with a few lads I had made friends with. Gordon seemed to know of me as I had just had a good season winning a few personal awards at Arlesey so I agreed to meet him in Watford at a hotel. I knew straight away I wanted to play for him. Looking back, I think it was a good decision as I feel I had more good times than bad at the 'Stones - disciplinary aside ha ha What was it like for you as a player in the couple of weeks leading up to the Rotherham

game?

The lead up to Rotherham was great, it was my old side and we got guite a bit of press that year through one thing and another (Chappers' Superman pants for one....) we did photo shoot at

the Vale for the Daily Mirror with us all in our pants and I'm sure I still have the cutting somewhere. Along with that, I did a few articles in the press and something for the Sheffield Star which was nice for my family up north to see. It was really exciting times for us as a club and very nearly a good result.

No doubt you made friends on the field but you also made some enemies - any of either you'd like to expand on? I made plenty of friends on the pitch during my time and to

this day I still am as I have just recently pulled the boots back on and signed for Berkhamsted. Enemies? Who knows, although I was perceived to be a bit of a loose cannon at times and overstepped the mark on a few occasions. I never thought I was a dirty player but I did want my team to win. I can honestly say there isn't anyone I really dislike and I don't feel I have to look over my shoulder when I go to away grounds be that as a player

or a manager...but one or two people may tell you different! Apart from a couple of oneoffs, you played alongside nine different centre halves (Marcus Gross, Alan Massey, Aaron Goode, Andrew Howell, Marvin McCoy, Dale Bennett, Carl Martin, Darren Locke, Rob Fitzgerald) - all very different players. How did you adapt your game to play with them? I could never adapt my game. I play hard and physical, win my aerial battles, organise my side and instil a never say die attitude in players around me. Each of those players adapted to

me! Some pairings do complement each other though; I liked playing with Massey as he was young and athletic, aerially good but he also had a little bit of recovery pace, something that I didn't really have. It helped me play to my strengths having someone at the side of me that could clean up anything I missed and recover for me if I got out of position. Carl Martin and Marvin McCoy also fitted that mould on many occasions, we complemented each other really we'll. I would set my stall out to attack everything and get close and physical with strikers, they

would just mop up my leftovers. Lockey was the most similar to me which is why I signed him for St. Albans when the chance came up. What would they say they got from vou?

I knew what I was as a player and I knew what I wasn't. I tried to affect the game in both penalty boxes, I think some players today think that all you need to do is

look good on the

ball, do a couple

of tricks and that's

enough but you win games by scoring and not conceding. I was a dog, a leader of the pack with limited ability but a hunger and desire to win.

And then onto Management. Was that always on the radar for when the playing career ended?

Management was just the next step for me really, First Team management came way earlier than expected obviously, as I had only just finished my level 2 badge and was running a very successful youth team at St. Albans with my joint manager Graham Golds. Management came quite naturally for me though as I was skipper at every club I played at and loved and thrive on responsibility. It is the toughest thing I have ever done though, especially at this level as a new manager. It's hard - not the match days or the training but the other 20/30 hrs a week you have to put in making sure everything can run smoothly for everyone else. Making sure you cross the t's and dot i's, it's a full time job believe me so trying to juggle that with my day job was tough.

I wouldn't change a thing from my time though, I had some great successes: a promotion, two FA

Cup First Rounds an FA Trophy 2nd round plus a Herts County Cup win. Overall, I was pleased with my three years in charge and it was a shame it ended the way it did, but myself and club

I will definitely still be involved in football one way or another, like I said earlier, since resigning I have got the boots back out for Berkhamsted. At the time of taking on the manager's role at St Albans I was captain of the side and playing week in week out under ex Borough manager David Howell.

Since resigning I have worked really hard on my fitness with a view to pick up my playing career again, and yes I have injury issues but nothing I feel will hold me back from playing competitively again. I'm enjoying my break from management but I would listen to offers from pretty much any club at any level really I don't discount maybe going back to the youth ranks either. I have learned so much already in my short time and I'm looking

to do my UEFA B licence this year . All I ever want is to do is bring success for the club I'm involved





through to the next round. I care about winning because it feels better than losing.

All of us know someone - possibly someone close to us - that doesn't 'get' football. ("It's only a game". "Why do you love Wealdstone so much?" etc.) To these people I have a stock riposte: I ask "Do you understand the attraction of gambling?" And most people do understand the attraction of gambling. 42 years ago.. the days when Met Police FC actually WERE policemen

Tuesday April 23 1974. Southern League Division One South: Met Police 0 Wealdstone 4

THIS was the season that ended the Stones' long, long wait for a league championship trophy.

It had been 19 years since the old amateur club had lifted the Athenian League title, and in the meantime the club had switched to the more powerful Isthmian League and then, in 1971, joined the semi-professional ranks of the Southern League.

And many were doubting the wisdom of the committee men who decided to plunge Stones into this expensive realm... the



club lost shedloads of money in the first two seasons, and for little reward as the team finished 12th and then 8th... a poor return for the forward-looking committee, who had been hoping for attendances in the thousands but instead saw an average of around 600 at the

13,000-capacity Lower Mead. But then came Sid Prosser. The Stones lured the charismatic manager from Isthmians St Albans City - renowned as one of

the best-drilled, most-entertaining side in that division - and within 18 months he had moulded a team ready to take the step up into the Southern League Premier Division... in those days just one level below the Football League.

Prosser's main coup was bringing a mix of good young

professionals and seasoned campaigners to Lower Mead. George Duck had been trumpeted as the club's salvation in the summer of '72 when the 20-year-old was persuaded not to walk away from the game after bad experiences at Tottenham and Southend - and he was to prove just that as he rattled in 30-odd goals in his first campaign and then an amazing 64 as Stones carried all before them in this title-winning 73-74 season.

Terry Dyson was another ex-Spurs pro (indeed, a

AS WEALDSTONE go on winning match after match, not letting up even now the Southern League championship has been won, one is fast running out of superlatives. It took the super-Stones precisely 11 minutes to systematically and ruthlessly dismantle the Police at Imber Court on Tuesday. After this short spell they were three goals up, and as a contest the game was over.

Wealdstone have now not conceded a goal in their last five matches, while scoring 10. Obviously they are determined to enter the Premier Division in some style!

The match was memorable for the fact that George Duck scored his 58th goal of the campaign and his 100th for the club in two seasons. It is unlikely that either of these water marks will be erased for a long time. George is still the highest marksman in any of the three divisions, being five ahead of Bates (Stourbridge).

What is there left to say about a goal poacher of this calibre? Little wonder that for a long time past, two opponents have been his constant companions in every match.

But after the initial 30 minutes, when the Police would have hotly disputed the fact that they were only playing against 11 players, the brakes

Admitted by the hard ground. and a stiff wind, was hardly conducive to Wealdstone precision passing. But having sized up the opposition, and realising that they could play at half pace and win comfortably. they obviously felt there was little virtue in showing every trick in the book.

The result was that the Police dominated the second half territorially. Even so, little real danger ever came MacKenzie's way, especially as Eric Burgess turned in another performance to make one believe that he left Colchester (luckily for Weald stone) far too soon.

Wealdstone usually had suf ficient time in defence to allow the effervescent John Watson to fulfill his penchant for playing to the gallery. John went through his entire repetoire, in cluding three over head kieks to his own goalkeeper which by a little bit of imagination, could be counted as shots.

The "Clown Prince" of the dressing room, he would be the first to say he had to make sure Roy MacKenzie was still awake!

CONFIDENCE

Such is the confidence that Wealdstone now show in each other's ability. On recent per formances it is indeed difficult to see them losing any of the three remaining matches. One supposes they could perhaps become over-confident in one of these but class invariably tells - and they have an abundance of this.

The match opened dramatically as Wealdstone swept majestically into attack and in the very first minute Dickson handled in the box and Duck

stepped up for the penalty. His shot to the right of Mackle worth was stopped but the linesmen immediately flagged to signify that the former Leicester goalkeeper had moved early. George made no mistake the second time, substi-tuting undiluted power for the placed penalty.

Five minutes later Fairclough slammed in the second from the edge of the box, the ball being helped in by a defender, and four minutes later came the best goal of the game.

Bill Byrne, who was again in superb form, picked up the ball way out on the right, side-stepped a challenge and with his left foot crashed the ball under the bar from a difficult angle. It was reminiscent of his Basingstoke goal, and one for the memory.

Oddly enough Wealdstone saw less and less of the ball in

the second half when they had the benefit of the powerful wind, and O'Rourke and Neilson had reasonable chances for the Police. Their shooting was well off target and MacKenzie was never seriously troubled. Nevertheless, McCormick, Burgess and company had to become involved to a larger extent than in recent matches.

Against the run of play, Wealdstone went four up midway through the half, Dickson putting into his own goal as Henderson, Duck and Byrne converged on him. In his haste to get rid of the ball he put it well wide of his goalkeeper.

double winning legend of the great 1960-61 side) while John McCormick (who had been playing in Division One for Crystal Palace the previous season) and Eric Burgess (a stylish pro from Colchester) brought the experience that was to prove so important at the business end of the season.

And so we arrived at Imber Court on April 23, 1974. The Met were a decent mid-table side of serving officers - ves. in those days you actually had to be a policeman to play for the works side - and were regarded as hard to beat.

They were made up largely of lower league ex-pros who had switched to the force as they neared retirement, which meant that they weren't perhaps as sprightly as Sid Posser's.

My main memory of the game - my first visit to Imber Court - was being impressed by the playing surface, the size of the main stand and the size of the travelling support with some 300 making the trip to Thames Ditton, Nothing's really changed in the intervening 42 years, apart from the fact that in 1974 about half that number travelled on

As a club, Ebbsfleet are not popular but I'd be surprised if their programme isn't

ERE we go with my totally-objective Stones programme survey for 2015-16. I'm told there are now three programme-collecting societies handing out awards this time - where we compete with just fellow non-League clubs, and also the full-time outfits - so let's hope the Stones Magazine repeats its usual good performance. If you go by these ratings it's a given!

Many of our fans have given up buying away programmes as a lot of our fellow clubs just regurgitate content from the internet. Original content is the life-blood of any publication otherwise why purchase it? This is how I saw our competitors in the Vanarama Conference South, in no particular order...

Maidstone United: Compact, slick and well designed but thin on original content- some good features but all lifted from the Kent Messenger website so most fans would have seen it all before. 7/10

Whitehawk- big and glossy and surprisingly good value at £2. Again though, thin on content with just the predictable manager's notes. 6

St. Albans - I've bought three of their issues this seaaon and the most recent one v Sutton Utd was noticeably a smaller A5 format, the same as this programme - which limited the big, punchy design that makes the Saints' prog right up with the best. Their issue for our game in November was very slick and readable with an excellent fan feature. 8

Oxford City- A very disappointing monochrome issue with content even more dull than the presentation. Only three pages of original stuff and even that

was only £2. 4 Maidenhead- Another black and white cheap minimal issue, with only Don Cross's contribution lifting it above the mundane. Well, nearly. 5 Dartford - Their magazine-style

programme starts well with its bigger size and graphics looking very St. Albansesge in fact I had a look to see if the printers/ designers were the same (they weren't). But then, sadly it tails off into the land of website cut and paste. Shame. 6

Hemel Hempstead- no pretence at cutting-edge design in Hemel's old-style offering but a lot of lively content. Quite like its no frills approach. 6

Full of well-thought out features with an Ebbsfleet angle (I particularly liked the pieces on the link between ex Northfleet star Vic Buckingham and his managerial influence on a young Johann Cruyff, and the history of black players in football). Sutton United - A tight, compact, cut price (£2) issue with its editor pointedly asking readers what they wanted to read in the issue for our visit back in August. ... "as most people clearly get their clubs news online". Originality! Depth! A bit of fun! How difficult is it, Mr Editor? 4

Margate - A strange hotchpotch design-wise, but just about passable content. Cheap and dull. 5

Gosport Borough- For those who consider 60 pages for just two quid a fabulous bargain... Well, Gosport's fat and glossy production is a mind-boggling exercise in frenetic Internet cut and paste. Almost anything online is in here, whether you want to read it or not.: a word search, sudoku, page after page of their own club history. And the only original stuff - a fan's columnwas crammed into a single page in tiny 7pt! Extraordinary! 5

Bath City- We kicked off the season at Twerton Park and city's programme had got physi-

cally bigger, but had shrunk in content. It's okay I suppose with a half dozen pages of good reading, but not as good as last year. 6

Chelmsford - Last season's conference south Programme Awards winners (the real awards, not this

one) was off the pace, to my mind, last year, Maybe the issue for our game was below par, but this issue was as fat as the Gosport's offering but with a good dozen pages of original content.
