THE ANDY Graham article in the Newport programme had a lot of our older fans - and even a lot of the younger fans - looking back in wonder at that far-off double winning season, 27 years ago.

In many ways it was a bizarre season. The Stones won the Conference national - in those days called the Gola League despite losing 12 league games... almost certainly more than we will lose this campaign! The pioneering points system introduced that season - never tried before, and never tried since - of two for a home win and three on the road was ideally suited to Brian Hall's counter-attacking side.

And certainly our away record was far better than our record at Lower Mead, where a return of just eight wins and five defeats would have normally meant a final mid-table placing at best.

So let me take you back to mid-March 1985. The Stones had had a great start to the season until an Autumn hiccup thar saw us fail to win in seven league games, and go out of the FA Cup to Grays Athletic (three levels below us in the Ryman Div One).

We climbed back to striking distance of leaders Altrincham with three successive wins - over Weymouth, Alty (crucially) and Frickley before another stutter
