



And a word of thanks to the Supporters' Club whose work around the ground has added to the comfort of everyone. Their efforts are fully appreciated by the Club Committee and also by the


players.

Flags of both nations were flying everywhere and it was obvious that all the townsfolk were eagerly awaiting the opportunity to see the English team. A large crowd had assembled at the ground, which was set in a delightful wooded valley. The crowd were completely silent as the National Anthems were played and echoed through the valley, the silence being broken by the referee's whistle and the game was on.

The home team, with terrific enthusiasm, set the pace from the start. They fastened on to every loose ball and speeded to the goal area, but their finishing was poor. A very speedy return to the Luxembourg Airport, a grand send off by the continental club officials, and the Wealdstone party boarded their waiting aircraft, very jubilant, for they had not been beaten. Yes, indeed, they were true champions of Luxembourg.
