"SOCCER CHATTER"

Another football season is well under way and as always arguments rage furiously. The present time gives the football enthusiast ample topics for discussions, with the recent World Cup series fresh in our minds and Walter Winterbottom's resignation from the F.A. The Football Association wisely making two separate posts tsniead of the combined Team Manager/Director of Coaching post held by Mr. Winterbottom.

To the followers and supporters of English football once again the World Cup series was bitterly disappointing. People keep on saying, "We still have the best footballers in the world". However we still fail at top world level competition. Many reasons have been given for this, changes in environment, ground conditions and food are often put forward for our players' seemingly sub-par performances. First and foremost we must ask ourselves honestly, do we have the best footballers in the world? Possibly we have the finest raw material in the world. I think the answer lies in the lack of facilities to develop our raw material.

Are we now seeing the light? The apprentice professionals who can be re-installed as amateurs if and when they fail to make the grade. Why not go a step further—Soccer Schools. Obviously there are many snags—but then we expect them. Let us think along these lines, that every large city and town had a football school, where boys from 11-16 years of age did their academic work in the morning and during the afternoon session had football coaching, skills, practice and training by fully qualified coaches. at sixteen the boys fitted could progress to the apprentice professional stage. You may well ask how would the boys be selected for such a school? It would need full co-operation from the F.A., Ministry of Education, Football League, and the Schools' F.A.

We know the F.A. send coaches to visit schools—but six coaching sessions are only like a ripple in the ocean. After all, we have
