

Pain.. joy... and why artificial intelligence cannot comprehend the Wealdstone story

I WAS going to use Chat GPT to write my column today.

Writing prose for this august organ can be a grind at times, so I thought it would be easy to churn out a thousand or so words, top and tail it, personalise it a bit and hope it turned out more believable than Man City blowing the title.

But when I typed the words 'Wealdstone, cup success' even the great Al tool was stumped.

As has been well documented in this column, we have only reached the first round of the FA Cup 16 times in our club's 125 years' history.

Only thrice have we advanced from the first round to the second - and only once have we made it to the third. And after that our FA Cup record drops faster than a pair of trousers after a dodgy curry. Amazingly,

we haven't won a second-round match since beating Enfield in a second replay back in 1983, and in the next round we went out to Colchester United 4-0 after some bizarre player selections by team boss Brian Hall. It is at moments like this that it is worth taking a step back to see just

how far we have come as a club - not just from when we first arrived in Ruislip in the summer of 2008.

The first match attracted a crowd of 387 against Tonbridge Angels in the Ryman Prem, but that was seen as a success after the years at Northwood where attendances hovered in the late 200s-early 300s. While the Vale was guickly spruced up by our fans, it was still nothing much

more than the amateur-stan-

dard ground it had been for all its previous history. Over the years, both the ground and the gates have improved immeasurably. But let's not even talk about the early years: the progress since 2020 when we entered the National League has been massive, unimaginable. Many thought it would be for one season only, though Covid probably allowed us in the behind-closed-doors season to regroup. Then, under the stewardship of Stuart May-

tablished National League

goal in our epic 2-1 win over Reading

side with only his departure to Notts County sending us almost into a death spin to the National League South - until the Great Escape of the last five games of last season kept us in the division.

This current campaign has had its challenges yet we are currently in a run of one defeat in eight games (and even that was in the National League Cup against Fulham). We are sixth in the NL current form table.

The Matty Taylor way is starting to pay dividends: It's not been easy but with some injuries easing, a few tactical tweaks and the signing of a proper forward, it is working.

The club is now unrecognisable - not just from 2008, but even from 2020. The club is a totally different beast than the one that entered the National League.

For the first time ever, we are no longer properly part time, but hybrid, with players coming in some days of the week rather than just two evenings. The club is on its way to a professional playing side with an academy that has grown from nothing to nearly 200 students across three different sites and over two boroughs.

These yougsters are gaining an education in the classroom alongside an education on the football field - and the best-known of those graduates is laiden Bartolo, who is coincidentally now with Wycombe Wanderers and a Gibraltan full international. Though Stones did not receive a fee, the progress made will ensure and encourage future students to make Wealdstone their academy of choice.

The partnership with Brunel University grows and develops, with our coaches now training their football teams while the club and the academy have use of the fabulous facilities in a training base that rivals, or betters, many of our rivals.



When we entered the National league, our

average attandance was 1,030, the first time we had averaged more than a thousand since the mid 1970s. This season, we are averaging 1,739 - the highest since the 1960s.

ping 3,000 since we entered the professional era in 1971 have been: 3,400 v Wimbledon (New Year's Day 1975); 4,044 v Reading (FA Cup 2nd round 1977, though nearer 7,000 unofficially); and 3,100 v Southend (FA Cup 1st round, 1979).

When 3.012 watched the Barnet game last season here at the Vale the barrier was broken for the first time since Southend - as will today's match. We now regularly exceed 2,000 for league matches, something we never did even in the heyday of the early to mid 1970s.

There is even disappointment if a gate doesn't reach 1,500 nowadays, which has only happened twice this season.


The board should be applauded for the progress that has been made. People sometimes yearn for the good old days when everyone knew everyone - not necessarily a good thing - but change is inevitable, and change at pace is uncomfortable at best and quite often worrying... but change is a necessity in the modern world.

We can't stay the same if we want to progress. The holy grail now is the new stadium. As our

visitors today have shown, moving from Loakes Park in the centre of town to Adams Park at the end of an industrial estate at the edge of town, has been the catalyst for their success from a decent non-league side to a side capable of reaching the Championship. Had we not messed up the

I WOULD like to welcome both sets of fans today to what is a fantastic occasion.

Wealdstone followers have waited far too long for this cup tie... the overall rhetoric around cup competitions since I joined two years ago has been one of tough draws and bitter disappointments. It was incredible to experience that outpouring of joy and emotion from the fans when the final whistle went at Grimsby four weeks ago. Today is the reward.

I know that further down the footballing pyramid the FA Cup is still as special as it was 30 to 40 years ago. My Dad had the 1970 FA Cup final between Chelsea and Leeds United on video cassette which we would watch every once in a while, the early days of colour television showing a terrible pitch and even worse tackles!

We will have no such pitch worries today even if a certain Rochdale manager disagrees! Adam, Dan and his team at Turf Doctors have worked tirelessly on the Vale pitch since I've been here and huge strides have been made over the summer with its drainage and overall condition.

I was really pleased with our performance against promotionchasing Rochdale.

We had planned for a tactical battle where Dale would play from the back and stick to their strong footballing philosophy- but for whatever reason, we heard whispers

not risk the ball near their own goal. This played into our hands as we've been very strong recently at what we call the 'ugly stuff'... Running, pressing, second balls and tackles. We dominated in all departments.

Then came Eastleigh which was very different, in awful conditions. Looking back at the game as a whole you can see how the wind dictated how the match was played but we played really well in the second half and fully deserved at least the point we won thanks to Sam Ashford's header following a fantastic move.

Something which has struck me in the past three league matches is the manager's problem-solving at half time.

The gaffer and his staff have identified tactical details (I won't divulge too much) during the first half and relayed it to us at half time. Credit to the players, we have then been able to apply the tweaks resulting in an aggregate second half score in our last three games of 4-0. The squad will take confidence from this and will have real belief that we can be the shock story of the second round.

As most of you will know, Wycombe Wanderers hold a special place in my heart: It was the club where I made my EFL professional debut and I still have framed both my debut shirt and the shirt in which I scored my first professional goals away at Hartlepool. One sits close to kick off that they may # on the wall in my Dad's place and

one is with me.

Wycombe havecome a long way since I played there. The year I broke through, we stayed up on the last day in League Two, beating Torquay away 3-0 while relying on Bristol Rovers slipping up at home to ensure our EFL safety. The club was perilously close to not only relegation but financial trouble too. The following season, newly-appointed manager Gareth Ainsworth took us to the play-off final at Wembley where we lost on penalties.

The club is in a fantastic position now. One which most fans couldn't have imagined on that sunny day in Torquay in 2014! Matt Bloomfield had the daunting task of following Ainsworth but he has changed the direct playing style and has Wycombe incredibly top of League I ahead of giants like Birmingham.

As a young pro, 'Blooms' was the consummate professional and one who academy manager Richard Dobson would tell us to copy. His work ethic and humility probably makes him the manager he is today.

I used to sit on the same table on the coach to away games with Matt and he once taught me a valuable lesson to not trawl through Twitter (now X) after games looking for possible praise.

"If you want to read the praise, you'll have to but up with the criticism" he said. Since then, I rarely log in after a match, win or lose. It's the key to staying level-headed in such a turbulent industry. UTS! -Max




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
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TIM PARKS MEETS THE OTHER HALF OF THE STONES'

Paul Hughes on his star-studded Chelsea days of Gullit and Hoddle and just why the Stones are a delight to coach



THE STONES assistant manager Paul Hughes was musing on the iconic head coaches he played under at Chelsea.

"Glenn Hoddle was the best - playing alongside him in training was a real education. His passing range was astonishing: left foot, right foot, and his disguised passing had to be seen to be believed.

"And when he went to manage England, Glenn was succeeded by Ruud Gullit, not just a great player in his day but an excellent tactician who could react cleverly to situations within games. He had a really good footballing IO.

"As players we had to deal with that aura but he managed to get his ideas of possession-based football across to everyone."

Paul was in the Chelsea first team for the 1996-97 season (though left out for the FA Cup Final win over Middlesbrough after playing in the quarterfinal against Portsmouth, missing out on the semi-final through injury) and in 1997-98 which ended with the Blues lifting the European Cup-Winners Cup. Again Paul missed out on a final appearance. He was a key attacking midfielder in a Chelsea team that suddenly attracted the best players from across the globe.

"I was playing with people like Gianfranco Zola, Roberto Di Matteo. Gianluca Vialli, Frank Lebouef, Mark Hughes and Dennis Wise -

The same

who was a really good footballer by way, he didn't just go round kicking people!"

Hughesie scored on his Premier League debut against Derby County in a 3-1 win at the age of 20. and then against Coventry a few games later - but that first season was blighted by a pelvic injury similar to the one that sidelined the Blues' Romanian international Dan Petrescu. They were flown to Italy for specialist physio treatment.

Paul had played 22 times for the Blues, scoring twice but with the bulging Chelsea chequebook getting an airing he knew his days were numbered.

So did you feel comfortable in such exalted company? I asked. "Well, yes, the standard of training was very high. We played a possession game,

one-touch which resulted in every player knowing what he'd be doing in advance of receiving the ball.

"There was one rule that Ruud Gullit used to preach: It's never the fault of the man on the ball if it's given away. From that moment we knew the safest place was to be on the ball because the team has to provide two or three options for passes. That's a footballing ethos, an outlook that we've tried to replicate here at Wealdstone." Paul then went on loan to Stockport in

the Championship under Gary Megson; to Crewe Alexandra under Dario Grady and then to Norwich City under Bruce Rioch, all in short spells.

MANAGEMENT TEAM.... WITH A MIGHTY CV OF HIS OWN

Glenn Hoddle, meanwhile, had taken over at Southampton after his England stint and offered Paul a year's contract... but he got injured in pre-season with a torn tendon in his groin and failed to make an appearance. And when Hoddle was lured to his first love, Tottenham, new boss Stuart Gray let Hughesie go.

He then spent three enjoyable years at Luton Town, winning promotion from

League Two in his first season and from League One in his third... making 88 appearances and scoring seven goals.

"That was where I met Matt Taylor, at his first pro club, and he was quite a player! What was outstanding for me was the fact that although he was only a teenager he wasn't frightened of telling people what to do. He was a very forceful character!

"Matt was sold to Portsmouth, but I got ill in my final year with a virus that caused chronic fatigue along with an auto-immune problem which meant I bruised easily and couldn't train properly."

It was terrible timing for Luton. They had become embroiled in sanctions due to financial irregularities and were eventually docked 30 points after returning to League Two. They fell into non-League.

"So I left the game at the age of 30 and then got involved with my local club, Kings Langley, alongside Ritchie Hanlon who had been with me in the youth system at Chelsea."

Langley, then in the second tier of the London Spartan League, raced to three back-to-back promotions which ended with the village club in the Southern League Premier division.

Paul had needed to focus on a life after leaving professional football and he started a new role coaching communication for The Impact Factory, which now takes up 7 to 9 days a month of his busy schedule - but it didn't stop Hayes & Yeading trying to lure him across.

After previously managing H & Y Reserves, he now found himself masterminding the shock 2-0 win over Wealdstone in the FA Cup fourth qualifying round during the Covid season. "We actually reached the first round three years in a row, which I think is a record for a club from the third tier of

the non-league game. We lost 2-0 to Oxford United, who were then top of League One that 2020-21 season, and the following year just 1-0 to Sutton United who were on their way to promotion from the National League. In the third year we lost on penalties to Carlisle United, really unluckily."

But his life took a new direction at the age of 43. He married Maria and they had two boys in quick succession - and suddenly Paul found he was unable

to commit quite so much time to football. Five years down the line with Christian now three and a half and Theo one and a half, he was happy to accept Matt Taylor's offer to become assistant manager at the

Paul was brought up in Greenford and was soon playing Sunday youth football for Pitshanger Dynamos - and then Bourne End (where new Stones board member Danny Kindell was the standout player) before Chelsea scouted him at the age of 10 or 11 after appearing for the county team.

"We trained behind a stand in the car park at Chelsea and then later on on the Astroturf at Battersea Park... a bit different to the training facilities they have now!

"My dad was born in Birmingham and so I became a Villa fan, although not seeing any matches. I do remember playing for Luton against Villa in the Carling Cup at Villa Park, though, when we lost two or three nil. That was quite awesome."

As an ex-player at the top level, Paul realises just how good this Wealdstone squad is. Even if the early season results were disappointing.

"There was a frank discussion after the wasteful draw at Ebbfleet and since then the players have been pulling in the

same direction with the right mentality. "And the senior players were instrumental in that


the experienced lads here are very good. They're very honest and professional.

"There are no a***holes there: the senior players really set the culture and they help us, the management team, in so many ways.

"The narrative from Matt hasn't really changed from the summer, it's just that we are now winning games and they are getting their just rewards. This is the best group that either of us have managed - it really is a pleasure to coach."

ALL YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT WYCOMBE WANDERERS

Today's opposition in focus

Wycombe Wanderers were founded in 1887, at a meeting held at the Steam Engine pub on Station Road. Playing friendly matches in its early years, the club joined the Southern League in 1896, a year after having moved to Loakes Park, which was to be its home for 95 years.

The Chairboys resisted the opportunity to turn professional, remaining amateur and enjoying success as two-time champions of the Spartan League, joining the Isthmian League in 1921.

Ten years later, in 1931, they achieved one of the finest accolades to date, winning the FA Amateur Cup at Highbury in front of 32,000 fans, defeating Hayes 1-0.

In 1947, Frank Adams - a former captain of the club having made 331 appearances for the club - presented the deeds of Loakes Park to Wycombe Wanderers, enabling the club to own its own ground and provide the platform for future success.

Sid Cann was appointed manager in 1952 and led the club to their first Isthmian League title in 1956, which was then successfully defended the following year, in which they also reached a second FA Amateur Cup Final. On this occasion, though, they were defeated 3-1 by Bishop Auckland at Wembley.

Brian Lee became the club's first conventional manager in 1968 - with team selection having previously been chosen by committee - and his arrival heralded three more Isthmian League titles inside four years, while the club also reached the third round of the FA Cup for the very first time, losing I-0 to top-flight Middlesbrough in a replay after a 0-0 draw at Loakes Park.

A period of transition followed and Wycombe joined a national league - the Gola League - for the first time in 1985. They were relegated and promoted as the division became renamed as the GM Vauxhall Conference, and the departure of boss Jim Kelman at the end of the decade paved the way for a period of unprecedent success at

Wanderers' new home.

Martin O'Neill's appointment as manager came in the same year as the club's move to its current Adams Park home. In 1991, the Chairboys had an FA Trophy title to their name, clinching a 2-1 win over Kidderminster Harriers at Wembley, and came agonisingly close to winning promotion to the Football League a year later, just missing out on goal

However, success returned

the following season, and in some style, as Wycombe won the double to be crowned Conference champions and FA Trophy winners once again, with Runcorn being swept aside 4-1 at Wembley in the final.


The club's forward progress didn't end there, as their first season in the Football League ended in triumph, winning the play-off final 4-2 against Preston North End to reach the third tier, and they came close to another play-off adventure the following season in 1995.

O'Neill departed that summer and the club survived a couple of relegation scares, most notably in 1999 when Lawrie Sanchez steered the club away from danger with a memorable final day win at Lincoln City.

Two years later, Sanchez masterminded an incredible run to the semi-final of the FA Cup, beating Wolves, Wimbledon and Leicester on the way to a meeting with Liverpool at Villa Park, with the Premier League giants edging through with a 2-1 win.

Tony Adams was appointed manager in 2003 but couldn't halt a relegation back to the fourth tier, but the club turned their fortunes around quickly, building a promotion-chasing squad each year, including a play-off semi-final defeat to Cheltenham in 2006. The following year, Wycombe reached the semi-final of the League Cup in 2007 under Paul Lambert's tutelage, holding Chelsea to a 1-1 draw at Adams Park in the first leg.

Lambert took the club into the play-offs in 2008 but again there was disappointment as Stockport progressed to Wembley, but new manager Peter Taylor secured automatic promotion the following



year, only for the Chairboys to struggle in League I and they suffered an instant return, with Gary Waddock the new man at the helm.

Waddock rebuilt the squad, including the signing of inspirational captain Gareth Ainsworth, and led the Blues to another promotion in 2011, although again the spell in the third tier was short and sweet.

That summer of 2012 saw the club fall into the hands of its Supporters Trust, becoming one of the few fan-owned clubs in the Football League, and Waddock departed soon after, with Ainsworth taking the reins as manager. A year of consolidation was followed by a season of struggle, but a miraculous final day escape from relegation at Torquay proved to be the catalyst for a period of progress.

The following season (2014/15), the Chairboys accumulated their highest ever points total in the Football League to reach the play-off final at the new Wembley Stadium, losing out to Southend United on penalties, and enjoyed FA Cup adventures against Aston Villa and Tottenham Hotspur in the two years that followed.

Promotion to League I was clinched in the 2017/18 as Gareth Ainsworth led his side to a third place finish, sealing their passage to the third tier with a 2-1 win at Chesterfield as Player of the Year Adebayo Akinfenwa led the line once again with 18 goals in all competitions.

A year of consolidation in League I was followed



by the most memorable and remarkable season in the club's history, when Ainsworth's men sealed promotion to the Championship for the first time ever, under the new majority ownership of Rob Couhig and his family. The 2019/20 campaign was cut short due to the global Covid-19 pandemic, with Wanderers sitting in the play-offs on a points-pergame basis, and they romped past Fleetwood Town in the semi-finals before defeating Oxford United behind-closed-doors at Wembley Stadium.

The Championship season saw the Blues ultimately fall short of survival by just one point despite a heroic run of form in the final few weeks, returning to League I ahead of the 2021/22 season when fans were able to return to stadia after more than a year away.

Ainsworth departed in February 2023 to take up the manager's role at Queens Park Rangers, with club legend Matt Bloomfield installed as his successor, and he led the Blues to Wembley in his first full season in charge, with Wanderers meeting Peterborough United in the Bristol Street Motors Trophy Final. The Couhig family sold their majority stake in the club to successful businessman Mikheil Lomtadze in the summer of 2024.

Goalkeeper Franco Ravizzoli joined the Chairboys on a free transfer in September 2023, following his departure from Milton Keynes Dons.

2. JACK GRIMMER - Defence

Now in his fifth season as a Chairboy, popular Scottish right-back Grimmer arrived at Adams Park in summer 2019, originally signing a two-year deal before extending hs contract following the club's promotion to the Championship.

3. DANIEL HARVIE - Defence

Wanderers swooped for Milton Keynes Dons leftback Daniel Harvie in July 2024 after he'd made 166 appearances in four years in the north of the county.

4. JOSH SCOWEN - Midfield

Midfield battler Scowen returned to Adams Park in 2021 after starting his career in the club's academy, going on to spend a largely successful four years in the first team from 2011-15.

5. ALEX HARTRIDGE - Defence

Alex Hartridge was Wycombe Wanderers' first new signing of the 2024 summer transfer window. The left-sided defender left Exeter City at the end of last season after making more than 150 appearances for the Grecians

6. RYAN TAFAZOLLI - Defence

Iranian left-footed centre-back Tafazolli joined Wycombe during the 2020/21 summer transfer window, having played the previous season with Hull City in the Championship.

7. DAVID WHEELER - Midfield

Attacking-midfielder David Wheeler joined the Chairboys on the eve of the 2019/20 season, leaving Queens Park Rangers on a free transfer.

8. MATT BUTCHER - Midfield

Wanderers brought midfielder Matt Butcher to Adams Park on a permanent deal following his departure from Championship club Plymouth Argyle in January 2024.

9. SAM VOKES - Forward

Powerful striker Vokes joined the Chairboys in July

2021 from Stoke City, arriving with a wealth of experience - including on the international stage where his goal sent Wales through to the 2016 European Championships semi-finals - and proved his worth with 17 goals in his first season.

IO. LUKE LEAHY-Midfield

Luke Leahy joined the Chairboys in the summer of 2023, leaving Shrewsbury Town where he'd just won the Player of the Year award as well as being club captain and top goalscorer.

II. DANIEL UDOH Forward

Daniel Udoh joined the Wanderers on a free transfer after leaving Shrewsbury Town at the end of his contract in July 2024.

12. GARATH McCLEARY - Forward

Fans favourite Garath McCleary joined the Chairboys in November 2021 and has gone to play a key role in the Wanderers attack, providing additional creativity, trickery, goal threat and bags of experience.

13. LAURENCE SHALA - Goalkeeper

Laurie Shala was Wycombe Wanderers' seventh new signing of the summer in 2023, with the teenage goalkeeper earning a deal at Adams Park after impressing during a trial period.

15. JACK YOUNG - Midfield

All-action central midfielder Young arrived at Adams Park from Newcastle United in January 2022, going on to make his move permanent three months later.

16. TYREEQ BAKINSON - Midfield

Tyreeq Bakinson joined Wycombe in July 2024, arriving with plenty of experience at both Championship level and at the top end of League I, helping Sheffield Wednesday win promotion from the third tier in 2022/23.

17. JOE LOW - Defence

Weish defender Joe Low arrived at Adams Park in the summer of 2023 after impressing on trial, and went on to enjoy a fantastic debut season in light and dark blue. The former Bristol City man went on to earn his first senior cap for Wales in the 2023/24 campaign, as well as developing his international experience with the under-21s.

18. BRANDON HANLAN- Midfield

Explosive striker Brandon Hanlan arrived at Adams Park from Bristol Rovers in August 2021, having caught the eye of manager Gareth Ainsworth as a youth player at Charlton Athletic several years earlier.

19. SHAMAL GEORGE -Goalkeeper

Shamal George joined the Chairboys on transfer deadline day in August 2024, arriving on a permanent deal from Scottish Championship side Livingston.

20. CAMERON HUMPHREYS - Midfield

Cameron Humphreys burst onto the scene with a debut goal in the 2-0 win over Rotherham United at Adams
Park in August 2024 after arriving on a season-long loan from Ipswich Town.

21. GIDEON KODUA - Forward

Gideon Kodua returned to Adams Park on a season-long loan deal from West Ham United in August 2024. The exciting winger spent the second half last season on loan with the Chairboys,

22. NATHAN BISHOP - Goalkeeper

Nathan Bishop was the Chairboys' fourth new recruit of the 2024 summer transfer window, arriving on a season-long loan from Championship side Sunderland.

23. KIERAN SADLIER - Forward

Wanderers were thrilled to announce the signing of Kieran Sadlier on a free transfer following his release from Bolton Wanderers in the summer of 2023.

Wycombe Wanderers pulled off the signing their supporters had been craving all summer with the return of Fred Onyedinma to the club on a free transfer in September 2024.





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

In my early years as a supporter I assumed we ended every season winning a trophy at Wembley, which back then was almost true.

What made you come to your first game? Some friends of our family took me along.

Have you been a regular home and away fan since then? My dad and I went to a few games a season in the early 90s, and I think we got our first season tickets in 1995 or 1996, 98/99 was our first season going regularly home and away, and I only missed a handful of games between then and when I moved to the States in 2008. Are you confident Wycombe

can return to the championship this season? Who are the key men in your opinion? I'm writing this at the start of November, and between now and when we play each other the picture will become much clearer. I'd describe myself as quietly confident.

light, dark and royal blue... the 38 players to star for Stones and the Chairboys

THERE has been a rich history between Wealdstone and Wycombe with decades of fierce rivalry.

On other pages in this programme you can read about how Wanderers 'lured' the Stones stars of the late 1960s up the M40 with promises of wonga... which is reflected in the rather one-way traffic from Harrow into Buckinghamshire over the past 60 years. And this FA Cup tie is no longer a meeting of equals with Wycombe storming towards promotion to the EFL Championship while the Stones are fighting to keep their heads above the National League relegation trapdoor.

But that shouldn't stop us having a bit of fun putting together a team comprising of players who have turned out for both clubs over the decades. Definitely not! And there are lots of them!

Let's approach it in positional order....

Goalkeepers

Oddly, there appears to have been only two keepers in all these years: the Moroccan-born **Chuck Moussadick** (who later called himself Chuck Martini) who played 45 times for Wycombe between 1990 and 1996, during which he came on loan to the Stones in 1992 and made 8 appearances. The other keeper is the ubiquitous **Ashlee Jones**. The have gloves will travel man was briefly at Wycombe in 2009 and came to the Stones' rescue in 2021 to cover for the injured Jonathan North, performing creditably on nine occasions.

Right backs

There are also two candidates for the No.2 shirt:

pictured playing for Wealdstone in 2010... the defender is still turning out for Cray Wanderers at the age of 36!

Marvin McCoy

Nick Arnold, who played 31 matches for Wycombe while on loan there from Reading in 2013/14 season (and made 19 appearances for Wealdstone during the first half of the title winning 2019/20 season) and Marvin McCoy (above) who made 65 appearances for the Stones between 2010 and 2012 before being transferred to Wycombe where he played 94 times over four years.

Left backs

The standout No.3 players are probably **Gary Hand** (above) and **Neil Price.** On being released by Watford in 1968, 18-year-old Gary joined the Stones and in 3 spells until 1971 made 76 appearances, scoring 3 goals. Small of stature but tenacious and with a sweet left foot, Gary enjoyed his greatest years, first at Hendon, and then one glorious season in 1974/75 with Wycombe. Price. another ex-Wat-

ford player, spent 2 seasons at Loakes Park and then a brief 14 game stint at Lower Mead in the 1989/90 season.

Centre backs

Central defence is a bit trickier as there appears to be no cross-over between the 2 clubs in recent years. But three ex-Stones turned out for Wycombe in the early 1970s, Dave Bullock, Alan Phillips and Gerry Olsen, but it has been difficult to find out how many games they played for the Chairboys. Bullock was another ex-Watford youngster who joined the Stones in 1968 and played 74 games before moving on to Hayes in 1970. Phillips, a Welsh amateur international, joined us from Barry in 1968 and played 15 games before initially moving to Hounslow Town and then Hendon, Gerry Olsen, meanwhile, was a man mountain of a centre half (think Bowgett on steroids) who played for the Stones the entire last amateur season in 1970/71 before moving on to Wycombe. He is best remembered for his singular method of penalty taking where he aimed at the keeper's head!

left wing/right wing

There are three candidates for the right wing slot: Len Worley, John Hutchinson and Brian Greenaway. You have to be of a certain vintage to have seen Len Worley play, but he was a genuine star of the amateur game. His talent and trickery earned him the sobriquet of the amateur Stanley Matthews while Hutchinson was a discovery from local football who signed for the Stones in 1967. A goalscoring winger, John was highly regarded and was part of a mass exodus from the club to Wycombe in 1969. The speedy, tricky and hard working "Greeners" meanwhile was an integral part of Wealdstone's double winning side of the mid-1980s - over four seasons he amassed 167 appearances and scored 26 goals. But he was going to be class, having played at Fulham in the 70s. There is only one outstanding option for the left wing berth: Bernie Bremer, who joined us while still a 16 year old schoolboy in 1963 and, by the time he moved on to Wycombe in 1970, had played 285 appearances for the Stones scoring 96 goals - and of course scored at

Wembley in 1966 as Stones won the FA Amateur Cup against Hendon, 3-1.

Centre midfield

We have available a plethora of talent for these roles. The stylish Martin Blackler had been a part of Martin O'Neil's early teams from 1988 and was a decent signing for the Stones in 1992 while Abel Comben is perhaps an unusual pick. A research scientist based at Princess Risborough, Comben turned out for Wycombe before moving to Hayes and then, in 1952 to Wealdstone. Those who saw him play describe the No.8 as a fine exponent of the sliding tackle. Luke O'Nien (below) spent the entire 2014/15 on loan to Wealdstone from Watford scoring 4 goals from 37 appearances. Following his release from Watford, Luke signed for the Chairboys and over

3 seasons made 101 appearances and scored 15 goals. He signed for Sunderland in 2018, where he is currently the hugely popular club captain of the Championship table toppers.

Charlie Mapes most certainly had talent but somehow failed to fully realise his potential. Signed from Edgware Town in 2002, the David Beckham

playalike made 2I starts for the Stones before Wycombe signed him, appearing 15 times before moving off to Crawley Town. He later dropped back into non-league football with Hendon, Hemel Hempstead and Hayes & Yeading.

Coming up to date, Max Kretzschmar is now in his 3rd season with Wealdstone - and but for frustrating injuries he would have vastly improved on his 67 starts, plus 22 on the bench, scoring 17 goals. Over 3 seasons from 2013 to 2016 Max made 85 appearances for Wycombe and scored 9 times - and between his Wycombe & Wealdstone stints he made 164 appearances for Woking scoring 45 goals, and 48 appearances for Hampton and Richmond Borough, scoring 20 goals. A player!

Strikers

The two strkers' slots throw up some intriguing possibilities. The biggest name by a distance must be Simon Garner, Blackburn Rovers' record goalscorer who signed for the Chairboys at the age of 35 after netting 169 times for Rovers and then eight for West Brom, all in the Championship. His two years at Wycombe yielded 66 appearances and 15 goals. He then shipped up at Wealdstone for a last hurrah at the age of 39 where he helped the club secure the Isthmian League Division Three title (the only medal in his illustrious career) making 15 starts and scoring 4 goals. The next season he made a further 19 starts, scoring 11 goals before winding down his illustrious career with Windsor & Eton and Flackwell Heath, by which time he was 41 years old. Pure class.

Dennis Greene was a Martin O'Neill signing who enjoyed back-to-back promotions with the club. He moved on to Dagenham & Redbridge, Harlow Town and then Wealdstone. A talented player, his cocky Jack-the-lad demeanour could inspire and

irritate in equal measure!

Going back 75 years, the intriguing name of Henryk Mikrut pops up. Born in Krakow, Poland in 1924 he served with the 3rd Carparthian Rifle Division of the British 8th Army that saw action in both the North African and Italian campaigns between 1941 and 1945. Unsurprisingly, the 5,000-plus men within the division housed a number of very fine footballers who formed themselves into a useful team. The unit was disbanded in 1945 and many of the Polish soldiers chose not to return to their native country that had become a satellite regime of the Soviet Union - so Henryk, initially housed in Hodgemoor Camp near Chalfont St Giles, played for the army team (The Carpathians) that took on and often defeated senior English amateur sides of the time. He was snapped up by Slough Town, Aylesbury United and Wycombe Wanderers (where he was part of the side that reached the FA Amateur Cup Semi-final, pictured here) before signing for Wealdstone in 1951. A strong, stocky player, Mikrut had an eye for goal, was particularly good in the air and formed a lethal partnership with fellow Pole Henryk Wegrzyk to help power the team to its only Athenian League title in 1952. Unfortunately, injury blighted Henryk Mikrut's career and he died tragi-

cally early in 1961, aged just 37. Scroll forward 20 years and that excellent striker, Keith Searle, was in full swing. Plucked from local junior football by Wealdstone in 1965, he scored 70 goals in three and a half seasons before being poached by Brian Lee for his Wycombe side that would dominate the Isthmian League for the next half dozen seasons. Keith turned out 249 times for Wycombe, scoring 124 goals between 1969 and 1975.

It will come as a bit of a surprise to Wealdstone fans who saw him play that Dylan Evans scored 71 goals for Wycombe between 1973 and 1979. In a bid to help stave off relegation in 1981, manager Allen Batsford signed Evans from Aylesbury United. As a proven goalscorer it was to him that club looked to cure its complete dearth of goals. Dylan chipped inwith...er... no goals in 12 appear-

ances. The club were relegated.


Although he didn't play for either club over a long period, Mancunian Andy Graham enjoyed brilliant brief spells with both. The history teacher started out in goalscoring form for Lancaster City and Hyde United but following his move South to take up a teaching post he turned up at Wealdstone looking for a game. Having impressed in training he was signed and got his chance in the first team to replace injured leading goalscorer, Mark Graves. The rest is Wealdstone legend! Graham scored a number of vital, spectacular goals that helped the club secure the Gola League and FA Trophy double. Falling out of favour at the end of the following season, Alan Gane signed him for Wycombe where he flourished in left midfield and helped the club to promotion.

Also in contention...

There are other players who deserve a name check: defenders Bob Williams, Chris Seagraves, Steve Walford, Ryan Sellars, Tom Cadmore and Steve Dell along with forwards Byron Walton, Elliott Benyon, Dan Fitchett, Josh Umerah and Matty Wichelow. Wycombe have helped out the Stones on occasion by providing young loan players over the years and full back Robbie Rice (8 games) and striker Matt McClure (7 appearances, 4 goals) were real hits. The most notable loan signing, however, was Alan Massey who played 23 games in 2007. Shown the door by Wycombe some months later, the young defender signed for the Stones and over the following five seasons played 200 games. He has since also achieved legendary status in nine years at Maidenhead.










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STAT ATTACK WITH STATTO MAN HILLSY

GOOD morning! I can't get my head around an a.m. kick-off but welcome to

this exciting FA Cup tie between two teams with a rich shared history.

Two leagues and 67 places separate the teams to emphasise the fact that Wealdstone and the FA Cup draw just don't get on... for the last few seasons, Stones fans have been left infuriated by being paired with the toughest opponent possible.

The same happened again this year when Emile Heskey drew out the leaders of League One for this trip to Grosvenor Vale: Before their game last Tuesday, Wanderers sat four points clear of Wrexham with a game in hand. They have won their last nine games in all competitions, are unbeaten in 13 league games (after losing the first two to Wrexham and Birmingham), have scored 35 goals in fifteen games, scored 3+ goals in 5 of their last six league games and, for good measure have scored in every league game this season. Ouch!

Jacob Adams, Jack Cook and the rest of the rearguard can expect a busy afternoon. A little scratch at the surface of their match statistics is quite revealing and highlights where Wycombe are strong. Possession. In only 5 of those fifteen league games have Wycombe dominated (>55%) possession and overall their average is ever-so slightly below 50%. However an average of 13.1 shots and 2.3 goals per game shows they possess powerful/ pacey forwards, quality in the wing back areas and present a serious threat from set-pieces. Their total of 35 goals this season has

been shared across fourteen different players with the fascinating Richard Kone leading the way with 9 goals. The young Ivorian hit a 10-minute hat-trick when

coming off the bench against Peterborough last month and is no stranger to grass roots football having made his name scoring goals for fun at Essex Senior League side AthleticNewham.


What is perhaps most striking is their conversion rates, with nearly a quarter of all shots finding the back of the net and a daunting (near) 50% chance of a shot on target ending in a goal. Whether it's Kone, wide forwards Fred Onyedinma (above) or Daniel Udoh or perhaps towering defender Joe Low, our opponents pose a serious threat going forwards. It will be interesting to see how manager Matt Bloomfield uses his squad today, given they made changes in the

last round against York City. But regardless what XI takes to the field today it will be quality! However, this is the FA Cup and Wealdstone will be backed by a partisan home crowd (assuming the early start doesn't leave us half asleep) after finally finding their mojo after a slow start to the season. Matt Taylor's side has won 6 of their ten league and cup fixtures and are unbeaten in the league since 19 October, coinciding with the arrival of Alex Reid. His relationship with fellow forwards Sam Ashford and ex-Chairboy Max Kretzschmar gives us hope of laying a glove on Wycombe today.

The midfield will be a key area today and two youthful Stones will be looking to showcase their talents: Kallum Cesay, the star of the first round win at Grimsby Town and Jack Wells-Morrison who has gone about his business quietly and impressively in recent weeks. His pedigree should see him relish today's game.

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

have competition from the London pro clubs and were able to generate huge crowds to the iconic sloping arena that was Loakes Park.

My first experience of that came in lanuary 1970 when the Stones navigated FA Amateur Cup games against Vauxhall Motors (Luton) and struggling Bromley for the reward of a home last-16 tie with the Wanderers.

I was proud of our crowds, usually around the 1,000-1,500 mark but a whopping extra 3,000 from the Chilterns swelled our old Lower Mead ground (4,129 in total) to see our shortcomings exposed by the Wealdstone Old Boys of Wycombe. It was only 1-0 in the end but - like the whitepainted 'WWFC' graffiti adorning the Cinema End stand after the game - it left a mark that lasted for years.

Wycombe were surprisingly beaten by the powerful St Albans side in the quarter finals with Enfield beating Dagenham 5-1 in the Wembley final.

The following season was our last as amateurs and Stones fans were desperate for a decent final showing in the Amateur Cup. The wait for the first round draw was tense and Wycombe (runners-up to Enfield in the Isthmian League in 69-70 and currently on course to lift the league title) were the team everyone wanted to avoid. Especially at their Loakes Park fortress.

And so of course, Wycombe came out of the bag quickly followed by Wealdstone.

Our hopes that day were much, much slimmer than a Slimfast slimmer. We had been beaten 6-1 by the Chairboys in one of the early home league games.... although sur-prising the Wanderers with a 1-0 home win in the Premier Midweek Floodlit League game just a week before Christmas. That is the game referred to by Wycombe manager Brian Lee in his programme notes (left) - although it sounds like he is 'talking up' recent Stones performances just in case we pulled off

the Cup shock of the century!

It was a fighting performance though by the depleted Stones, utilising a well-rehearsed offside routine from centre backs Gerry Olsen and Rob Williams that so nearly forced the midweek replay that would have helped cashstrapped Wealdstone enormously. But with just five minutes remaining and our legs weakening, the Wanderers' England Amateur International Larry Pritchard crashed in the winner to 'a roar like Krakatoa' according to the Harry O reporter.

So that was it. Wealdstone's life in the Amateur Cup - a competition in which we'd made our name, at Wembley just five years earlier was over forever.

We finished in lower mid-table while Wycombe, as mentioned, won the Isthmian League although they again failed to win the Amateur Cup. Eventual holders Skelmersdale United (from Lancashire) dealt a 3-0 blow at a packed Loakes Park in the quarter-final.

'WE'VE MET BEFORE' CONTINUED

Into the 80s & 90s for the last meetings of the clubs... and who'd have guessed the scoreline?



WYCOMBE'S love affair with the Isthmian League continued right through the 1970s and 80s... and why wouldn't it when the club were stacking up six titles and enjoying stirring FA Cup runs enjoyed by millions on television?

The new Alliance Premier League kicked off in 1979 but Wanderers refused multiple invitations to join worst the 'Non-League elite' as the APL styled itself. But eventually, with disinterest amongst the Wycombe public in the mid-80s forcing a change of tack, they decided to join the thennamed Gola League... and finally renewed acquaintanceship with the Stones in 1985 after 14 years!

Wycombe found the boot on the other foot as Brian Hall's Wealdstone were the top club outside the Football League.. and indeed, had beaten the Chairboys 2-1 at Lower Mead on the way to winning the FA Trophy in Wycombe's

last season as an Isthmian League outfit.

This was the only period since the 1960s that the Stones held sway over the Buckinghamshire side. By the end of the decade Wealdstone were in de-

> cline and Wanderers had rediscovered their mojo - battling Barnet for automatic promotion to the Football League and seeing

the 2,000 and 3,000 crowds returning to Loakes Park.

It was in February 1989 that the clubs met for the penultimate time in a competitive game and once again it was Wycombe who edged the FA Trophy 2nd round tie I-0 at Lower Mead. Martin Blackler (later to play for the Stones) scored the only goal as our Southern Leaguers dominated against the Conference highfliers in front of a 1,400 crowd...



However, it was the construction of out-of-town Adams Park (completed in 1990) that was key to the Chairboys ambitions and in their first season there we clashed for the last time: another FA Trophy 2nd round tie in front of just under 3,000 at the shiny new AP on January 12th 1991. Again it was a tale of plucky losers as, astonishingly we bowed out again 1-0 after Steve Guppy broke the deadlock after 28 mins. John Comfort's match report (below) sums up the pride in the

LET'S MAKE HISTORY: STONES RECORD IN THE SECOND ROUND

OUR previous home FA Cup programme against Gosport Borough chronicled the Stones, exploits in the final Qualifying Round since Wealdstone FC was founded in 1899 eight pages of them, covering 28 games from Colchester United in 1950 to Bromley last season!

And if we'd been drawn at home in the First Round we could have looked back on 16 previous forays into Round One. But as for the Second Round, well, rather slimmer pickings. lust two occasions in fact...

Saturday December 17 1977, FA Cup 2nd round: Wealdstone 2 Reading I

WHAT a game! Probably the most dramatic afternoon in Stones history as the record books were ripped up with this, the club's first-ever (and last) home victory against a Football League club after a sensational 90 minutes.

I was still selling the last few raffle tickets in the Elmslie End in the opening minutes when I looked up and saw the ball crash off the post and into the Reading net... what?!

Keith Furphy's inswing corner (pictured above right) evaded the outstretched paws of visiting

We've only got here twice before.. could today be a glory day?



keeper Steve Death and astonishingly we were 1-0 ahead against the Fourth Division side after just six minutes.

On a bog of a pitch in front of a 7,000 crowd (officialy 4,104) it was the Stones - fresh from their shock 3-2 replay win against Div Three Hereford United in the First Round - who took the game to the Royals... though it took a penalty to

extend our lead at the Cinema End . Defender Lewis tripped Bobby Moss in the box and (on the word of a linesman) referee Alan Turvey pointed to the spot. Ace marksman George Duck stepped up and hit the post... but the referee deemed Death to have moved too soon. In all the hullabaloo, George stepped up for the retake and planted the ball home... only for Turvey to this time say he'd not blown his whistle! Said George: "There was so much noise I couldn't tell what was going on. So the third time I just blasted it up the middle".

Only a minute later Pat Earle pulled a goal back for Reading, but Stones took back control and were

worthy winners.

So it was all into the bar at the Lower Mead social club to hear the 5pm draw for the Third Round on telly... and you can imagine the pandemonium when OPR v Wealdstone came out of the hat!

The First Division outfit were many fans 'second team' - I know they were mine - and the thought

of seeing the likes of Stan Bowles, John Hollins, Leighton James and Phil Parkes taking on our heroes was almost too much to take in. We were well beaten on the day, 4-0, but what memories!

Saturday December 10 1983, FA Cup 2nd round: Colchester 4 Wealdstone 0
