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



A warm welcome to all from Southend on this magical cup tie afternoon

Last Saturday's rip-roaring 4-2 win over Sutton Utd here at the Vale epitomised the very reason we love football.

Because there is always hope. Because there is a dream that can always come true. And because an almost manic self-belief can turn an impossible position around.

Somehow, our players found that self-belief despite trailing 2-0 to an energetic and impressive Sutton team last Saturday - through sheer force of will, bravery, talent and intensity.

We simply flooded down the slope in the second half with Sak Hassan - who seized his chance as substitute, coming on for the injured Junior Tiensia after 10 minutes - leading the charge. He ended with one stupendous goal and three assists... probably the most influential performance in a single game since we were promoted back to the National League five years ago.

In fact the 24-year-old winger seemed to be everywhere in that second half, defending the halfway line as the last man, playing the ball out and always offering himself as an outlet on the flanks. And who would pop up 12 yards from goal to half-volley that sensational equaliser from Phillip Chinedu's powerful

run and cross? From averaging 5/10s across the team in that tentative and error-strewn first half (the main exception the magnificent Dante Baptiste) we suddenly had a team of warriors, first to the ball and creative with it. Sutton were simply blown away and as Sam Cox says in his interview overpage, our squad has set a benchmark that they must now try to replicate every week.

We have to be at that level to progress in the FA Cup today as we welcome Kevin Maher's Southend United to the Vale.

They were beaten here 3-2 under the lights in another roller-coaster contest two months ago but the Shrimpers have only lost two other games this season, 0-2 at home to Scunthorpe and then 2-1 at Eastleigh. They lie 6th in the NL table and beat Folkestone Invicta 4-1 in the Fourth Qualifying Round to set up today's First

Round proper clash. It's probably fair to say that this wasn't the tie that either side wanted... but Southend were probably the least enamoured. The dangled carrot of a Second Round tie is huge for non-League clubs, for both profile and monetary reasons and this is the chance for our Smith & Latimer Stand fans to outroar the close-to-1,000 Shrimpers fans in the ground today. These are the good times!

If today's game is level at 90 mins it will go straight to extra time and penalties as there are no replays from the First Round Proper onwards. The 2nd Rd draw is scheduled for 6.30pm next Monday live on TNT Sports and You Tube.

- 4) Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.
- 5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). Any misuse of such items in and around the Ground will result in those responsible being asked to leave the ground and, in line with football authority guidance, may result in a report to the Police, potential prosecution and a ban from the Club of up to three years.
- 6) No Smoking or Vaping inside the ground.

And especially at this club, where it's always been a dream of mine to go on an FA Cup adventure with Wealdstone.

From that first game between Southend and ourselves this season we know what they are capable of: they will come heavily tooled up with their talented squad but we also know that we are capable of giving ANYONE a game on our day.

I think we showed that last Saturday against Sutton - though you arguably also saw the best and the worst of us. After the defeat at York and then the disappointing defeat by Nottingham Forest in the NL Cup we were maybe a bit nervous and our first-half performance was below par and devoid of confidence.

But then that second half! I have to say I think that was the most proud of them I've been this season: the heart, the desire, the resilience and the courage they showed - not just to get the result but to play with that tempo made it one of my favourite performances of the season.

Was it tactical change? No, not really. We give these boys a lot of tactical information and it may be a bit monotonous for them. The half time team talk was more about character, personality and attitude. And you know, the senior players in that changing room are so important. Like Enzo, who is asked to play as a defender, then midfield and then up front in the second half! It's testament to his character and all-round ability. He inspires people. Then you have Max who came back into the team as captain, and he had some words at half time, while Big Mouss, though not playing, gets around the players... and Fela too. It's a young group and they need to learn about how to persevere, pull up their sleeves and dig deep. Sak Hassan espe-





WELCOME to the FA Cup first round.


Let's get the clichés out of the way: It's the road to Wembley; the great leveller; the trail of glory; the chance for journeymen to become legends, minnows to become sharks for a day; butchers, bakers and candlestick makers to become sporting superstars; impoverished non-league clubs to become rich beyond their wildest dreams.

Or if you're one of the 92 teams playing at a higher level than us in the pyramid... "Welcome to the FA Cup, it's an unwanted distraction from the serious business of trying to get promoted/avoid relegation/qualify for Europe in order to tap into a bit more of that cesspit of TV money that is rapidly swallowing up the game we love"

Thankfully I think the Stones remain in the first category. I love the FA Cup. And while getting a bye to the final qualifying round certainly improves our chances of reaching the coveted final 124 (not that it's always been much help) I have to say I genuinely miss those early rounds when we'd get drawn away and descend en masse on some unsuspecting and unprepared small town or village like Stowmarket or Brockenhurst where cows wander the streets. That was the only club I think I've visited where the entrance incorporates a cattle grid to keep livestock off the pitch, like we'd stepped back into a Thomas Hardy novel. Especially enjoyable if we came away with a comfortable victory.

I'm old enough to remember when the FA Cup

Paul Bowgett (right) heads against the Swansea post in the epic 1-1 draw at Lower Mead in November 1986





final was a huge national event, monopolising the TV schedules on both channels from morning to teatime on the day. At school, no matter who was in the final, we'd all pick a side and every plastic ball game in the playground for a week before would be a pre-enactment of the final. And when we got bored with that we'd beat each other up in homage to the new fangled pastime of 'football hooliganism'. The first one I remember clearly was West Bromwich Albion v Everton. Yeah, I'm that old.

The powers have done their utmost to diminish and demean the competition by abolishing replays for the convenience of the elite few, trying to ameliorate their contempt for tradition and the wishes of the paying fans by dribbling more money into the sponsorship pot. Yet TV's insatiable appetite for live matches will fall apart if any government ever has the moral fibre to clamp down on gambling advertising.

Twelve months ago we went to Grimsby where Alex Reid facilitated a last-gasp smash-and-grab victory after we'd been pummelled for two thirds of the match. I think most of our supporters in attendance that day would

consider it one of the greatest of their Wealdstone supporting lives; the euphoria at the final whistle is exactly what we, as football fans, crave.

Now if you're reading this as a Southend fan you're probably thinking, 'You won 1-0 at Grimsby, what's the big deal about that?' Well, this is the big deal. For maybe 50% of the Wealdstone supporters in attendance it was the first time in their lifetime that the club had reached the second round of the FA Cup, the last occasion being more than forty years previous. During that time Wealdstone have declined from National League champions to failing to win promotion from Isthmian League Division Three before climbing most of the way back. Meanwhile we have suffered the humiliation of having to play in the FA Vase, we've been knocked out of the FA Cup without even reaching the qualifying rounds, and we've been eliminated by the likes of (and, believe me, this is not a comprehensive list) Hertford Town, Beaconsfield, Metropolitan Police, Burnham, Potters Bar, Ruislip Manor (an away tie on this very ground you're attending today) and Burgess Hill. So let us enjoy our brief moment in the spotlight.

If things aren't going well for Southend today you may well hear a chorus of 'Non league, and you know you are'. Well we're non league and we're proud of it.

The Burgess Hill Disaster of 2017 has entered the annals of Wealdstone folklore, some would say every bit as prominently and momentarily as our Wembley triumphs of 1966 and 1985, if not for quite the same reasons. It was a result and a performance so bad the entire club went into spectacular meltdown, civil war almost. It's still talked about in hushed, reverential terms today.

As for my personal nadir, I would have to cite the

third qualifying round defeat to Belper at the White Lion Ground in 2000. I took this especially personally. The previous Saturday Belper had played a Northern Premier League fixture at Stocksbridge Park Steels, a few miles from my home, and the club had inadvisedly asked me to prepare a dossier on the opponents. For all I know about football - despite 30 years of watching Wealdstone - they might as well have asked Samantha Fox (ask your parents) to give an assessment of a nuclear physics symposium. But I went along dutifully and among my conclusions were the fact that Belper looked decidedly weak on their left flank.

So imagine how smug I was feeling when, just 15 minutes in, we were 2-0 up with both goals Swaysland/Jones combinations from the right wing. Yes, I'm a football genius after all! But we all know what happened next. (We lost 3-2 - Ed).

That's the whole point. I imagine the vast majority of Liverpool or Manchester City fans greet another Champions League or Premier League trophy on the shelf with a entitled shrug of ennui from their armchair. To paraphrase the great philosopher King Louie, they've reached the top and had to stop and it's not bothering them one bit.

I think I can reasonably predict that Wealdstone will not reach the top any time soon. The triumphs, small as they may look to a Manchester United fan (as I thought while watching Grimsby despatch them from the League Cup on TV), are all the sweeter because we've experienced the disasters. Plenty of them.

Let's hope we can start today, and come five o'clock, or however long penalties take, we've got that Grimsby feeling back. Not Burgess Hill.

And by the way, if, after her modelling career was over, Samantha Fox **did** go to university and get a degree in nuclear physics I don't want to know, OK?

in their day. It's harsh to swap out Alex Dyer; I really enjoyed watching him play particularly in our Ryman days, but I struggle to name a player we've missed more than Ashley Charles. He had a massive impact on the side and when he got his move to Bromley it correlated with a drop off in form – and points. I also think we were a bit spoilt with Sterling, Jones and Baptiste at the back end of the 90s. Sterling and Baptiste ended up playing at a higher level, Baptiste briefly in the EFL with Luton. I loved watching Baptiste play and the Rocky theme tune sung by the fans every time he scored. Brian Jones was of course another maverick who probably should have played at a higher level too, a brilliant player.

Most of the other players speak for themselves and I've gone a bit *Dogs of War* with Tucker and Massey at the back with Charles sitting in front — that would genuinely be a formidable spine, combining physicality, tenacity and combative edge.

What about the current side? I was pleased Sam Cox got the job in the summer. I was firmly a member of the camp who felt he was bang unlucky not to get it last season. I already see a team that embodies his ethos and the way he played his career. Relentless, positive attitude, combative and a team that leaves it all on the pitch. What I like especially is Cox and the recruitment team have built a side that is big, physical and has some legs about it.

It has been said by others but there is a nice balance to the side. We have players with high ceilings like Woodman and Kadji and experienced heads such as Cookie, Boldewijn and Kretzschmar. Alfie Massey – so sad he got injured – is an absolute Rolls Royce EFL star of the future and Chinedu has all the ingredients to also feature regularly in the football league. My favourite player, however, and I'm maybe a little biased as I also support Spurs — Georgiou. I'm glad to see his minutes have upped considerably this year; technically I think he's tops. We lack a little quality at times

in the final third and Alex Reid is a big miss from last season. I'm far from Nostradamus (I was near the bottom of Predict-a-Score last season), but I felt before we started, that we'd avoid the drop this time round. On stonesgoals.co.uk I did pre-season previews of all 24-sides and my bottom four was Gateshead, Truro City, Braintree and Morecambe. I think 3 of those are already occupying those places. I will fess up that I never saw Sutton or Woking at that end of the table either... but that's why we love football.. with the side we have and the start we have made, we should be optimistic of a finish towards the top half.

Is football a big part of your life? Yes, huge really. Dominates my weekends although nowadays I must prioritise my time. Never has the record button on Sky come in so handy for Super Sunday matches, for example.

Tell us about @StonesGoals... It was an exciting new addition ten years ago. Yes, still very much operating but now with kids and working

commitments availability is often an issue and it is harder to keep up the same level of meticulous detail.

I properly started it the season we won the Ryman Premier, which seems like a long, long time ago now. I would regularly do match previews, goals as they go in, and then highlights. For a brief period, I was dubbing FIFA commentary over the top and interjecting Soccer Saturday features with the matches – this took hours(!); it was great fun even if it only amused me.

I remember one intro to match highlights (@StonesGoals, *Brackley Town 2017 on YouTube*) where it started off with a clip of Jeff Stelling from that day's Soccer Saturday with the line "The transfer window has slammed shut, unfortunately we couldn't move any of these four on" and then the camera suitably cut to the Vale and four of the Wealdstone management team wandered out the tunnel

(we got trounced 4-1 that day)! Was always meant in good spirit - these were of course the latter days of the GB. Joking aside, you'd be hard pressed to find a greater servant to Wealdstone than GB, a true club legend.

I guess the difference then was that, in some cases, I was the only camera(!). I do think it's sad that there is a lack of footage from the 90s and before. When I think of my Wealdstone-supporting journey, and some of the moments that inspired me, you have cult heroes like Lee Walker who stuck one top bin on the final day of the '99 season and took his shirt off to celebrate, whirling it round his head like he'd just won the Champions League, in front of 600-odd people. It's robbery that it's not on video — don't worry Lee, I remember, a great strike and superb celebration.

As we were marauding to the Ryman Prem title in 2014 it dawned on me that we should encapsulate these moments for years to come; provide the fan perspective of what makes Wealdstone great and that's why @StonesGoals was

born. In those early days, I used to get occasional messages from players asking me to clip up bits from the matches for their showreels and of course some of the videos got viral exposure: Scott Davies v Brockenhurst from beyond half-way and, more recently, the last-minute equaliser at Barnet. Whilst other less savoury moments were captured like the end of match scenes at Hungerford in 2016 when shot-shy Stones succumbed 2-0 and Elliot Benyon verbally defended GB for his tactics.

I think some of the exposure these videos get on Twitter(X)/YouTube can only help the club grow; it keeps a connection with a wider audience and helps put Wealdstone on the map. It's our club to make a noise about, and we should continue to do that. "Syls Goals" (@syl_isylma) does a superb job, home and away, every week. And I know first-hand; it is hard to stand there filming all game and keep calm when a worldly flies top bracket; so huge respect to Syl Allen, a great advocate for our club.

In recent seasons, as our standing in the pyramid has changed so has the broadcasting landscape but where time permits, I am actively thinking about ways to evolve @StonesGoals. I'm not Spielberg, I'm just a normal bloke with a camera phone but if any Hollywood agents are out there — what better movie than the fall and rise of Wealdstone FC. Football is a mirror of life in many respects, and when you think of the journey Wealdstone FC has endured the last 40 years you can't really write scripts like that. It has everything.

The dodgy Lower Mead dealings, the longevity of GB, the PEPF scandal, the characters who have supported the club through thick and thin, the Raider story, the relocation out of the Borough and community regeneration in Ruislip; all played out as a backdrop to a side who somehow climbed off the canvas to get back to Non-League football's top table. And with Mr Semaca on board the next chapter is about to be written... it's a good time for Hollywood!

Are you enjoying the games as much now we are in the National League? The short answer is yes. I longed for Wealdstone to play in front of these big crowds when I hark back to my memories of

watching with a couple of hundred (if that) at Yeading. Soulless days in many respects. And like I picked out the Thurrock game in 2004 as one of my highlights, I guess that was an exception to the norm in those days - it drove the desire to want to see Wealdstone compete at the top level of NL; the quality of players on show, the crowd, the atmosphere.... the National League delivers all those things, and the minimum should be striving to stay there.

On the other hand, I enjoy **winning** football, and winning has been harder to come by at this level. We have held our own for 6-years in the division - yes, by the skin of our teeth, but now the club needs to be bold and push on. The boardroom and constitution changes should provide us a platform to push forward - most recognise it needs to happen for the club to thrive. If it does, I feel we can move the dial away from the narrative that Wealdstone is always the underdog. Let's start to have faith in the weight we're punching and push towards League 2. Yes, there are some huge clubs at this level, but there is no reason why Wealdstone cannot continue to evolve and grow and be as big as some of these in tomorrow's world.

A new ground would help, of course, but it shouldn't be inconceivable to see Wealdstone in League 2 (or above) in years to come.

Do you still manage to get to many games? At the time of writing this (a month ago), I have been to eight games this season out of a possible 20 (all comps inc. friendlies). I struggle to get to the away games; mainly owing to distance and time commitment involved. Now with my eldest daughter well in the school routine we are invariably away every half-term and most of August and then I travel reasonably often with work.

Has Chris O'Leary's wonder header at Dartford in 2012 been matched? If it has, I can't think of one. I was right behind it and think I almost fell down the stairs celebrating. I've just watched it back on YouTube and the way he attacked it, wow.

Is there any aspect of your Stones-watching experience that could be improved? Not of the watching experience. The next milestone is to have our own ground again. It would be good to see more media output on away days, training, player interviews, players of yesteryear and where they are now - the latter on YouTube

Podcasts etc gets real engagement; and "where are they now" is always an interesting watch/listen even if it's not a player at your club. I'd genuinely love to know, for example, what a Gordon Bartlett dressing room was like. Or memories from the final day of Lower Mead (I was there, but only 5 years old), but what was said before the lights went out in the changing room for the final time? I'm sure there are some iconic stories hidden in the sands of time that need to be heard.

Do you still buy a programme, and would it bother you if it was online? Not often enough is the honest answer. When I have brought my spare change, I do. It's a great read; my old man gets a programme religiously so if I haven't got a copy, I invariably end up reading his several days later.

I know I'm supposed to be a digital guy working in a digital world, but nothing can replace that fresh print smell and momento of a great day out. You just can't replicate that online. The honest answer is the club should probably cater for both, if you buy a physical programme, you have access to the content online also; if you can't make the game and want a digital copy you can pay for that at a slightly reduced rate (basically less the print production cost).

And finally... how do you view WFC's future?

Positively. Look at the improvements to the attendance since the club moved to Ruislip. Look at the community initiatives with local schools; look at the number of kids in attendance. There is a tribal nature about football and Wealdstone epitomises community, togetherness and belonging. I think the countless volunteers who have stood up over the years repeatedly, even when the club has been at their lowest ebb, should be proud of what they have done to keep the club going and they have positioned the club in a manner where the new man can take it on and grow it to where it needs to be.

I hope we can move away from the begging-bowl mentality and look at the ownership models of clubs higher up the pyramid who have done the unthinkable (eg Brentford, Bournemouth). In five years' time, I hope to see the club challenging to push for the EFL - and approaching double the average gate we have now. Why not?

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
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ALL YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT **SOUTHEND UNITED**, THE SHRIMPERS

Organised football in the Borough of Southend-on-Sea really started taking hold in the late 1890's. Clubs such as Southend Victoria, Southend Amateurs, Southend Corinthians, Southend Ramblers and even Southend Wesleyans were on the local scene at this time.

A team called Southend United were recorded as early as 1898 but it is not known where they played. One thing is for sure is that they are in no way related to our club. At the same time over at Marine Park, which incorporated a football pitch among its attractions, Southend-on-Sea Football Club were establishing a reputation as a top amateur side. The clubs' colours were white shirts and blue 'knickers'. By 1900 this side has changed its name to Southend Athletic, and although Marine Park was later to become The Kursaal, Athletics' ground was radically different to the one occupied by Southend United in their early Football League days. It consisted of a railed off pitch surrounded by a 'trotting' track and a large pavilion with absolutely no spectator accommodation. Also during 1900 a new pitch was laid out adjacent to the large property in Victoria Avenue called Roots Hall. Ironically one of the first teams to stage games there was Southend Athletic. However the face of football in the Borough was to change forever following a meeting held in the Blue Boar Public House on May 19th 1906. It is well documented that Southend United were formed at this meeting convened by landlord Oliver Trigg and a band of fellow enthusiasts. In 1920 the Southern League clubs, including Southend United, were elected en bloc to form the new Third Division of the Football League. A year later this became the Third Division South as a northern section had also been introduced.

The 1955/56 campaign was to prove one of the most pivotal in the club's history. After 21 years at the largely unpopular Southend Stadium the Blues

moved into their new home. The new Roots Hall had been built entirely by internal labour with Sid Broomfield leading a small band of men to build the stadium we know and love today.

The entire cost of the stadium, save for a small grant from the Football Association, was met by the Supporters Club and their extensive fund-raising programme.

Southend United joined the new national Third Division in 1958, where they remained until 1966 when they suffered their first ever relegation, into the Fourth Division. The club had to wait six seasons until 1972 to experience the club's first ever promotion as runners-up behind Grimsby Town. In 1976 Southend suffered relegation again before taking another runners-up spot behind Watford in 1978. Another relegation in 1980 was directly followed by one of the most successful seasons in the club's history as they won the Fourth Division Championship in 1981, breaking a series of club records in the process. Despite success on the pitch and low admission prices, the club's gates were low and condemned as "a bad reflection on the town"]

In 1984, the club was relegated to the Fourth Division (Bobby Moore was manager), and the following season finished 20th, narrowly avoiding having to seek re-election to the Football League. However, Southend gained promotion in 1987. Although relegated again in 1989, successive promotions in 1990 and 1991 saw Southend United reach the second tier of the Football League; in 1992, under manager David Webb, the club finished 12th in the old Second Division, having briefly topped the division on New Year's Day, 1992. In 1995, former Liverpool player Ronnie Whelan became player-manager & Southend finished 14th in Division One, but were relegated a year later and Whelan left the club. He was replaced by Alvin Martin but Martin was unable to avoid a second consecutive relegation. Martin left in April 1999, with Southend fifth from bottom in the Football League. Alan Little was manager for a brief spell before the club turned again to David Webb, then Rob Newman, Steve Wignall and, in late 2003,

former Southend United midfielder Steve Tilson.

Under Tilson, Southend reached their first national cup final, meeting Blackpool in the final of the Football League Trophy but the team did not rise to the occasion and Blackpool won 2-0. Tilson then led Southend to promotion to League 1 in 2005, while making a second successive appearance in the Football League Trophy final, which the Shrimpers lost 2-0 to Wrexham, but the third appearance at the Millennium Stadium in the League Two play-off final against Lincoln City brought success giving the club its first promotion via the play-off system and their first major silverware since 1981.

In May 2006 Southend became League One champions after beating Bristol City 1-0 at Roots Hall - the club's first title in 25 years. Tilson was named as the League Manager Association's Manager-of-the-Season for League One.

In 2006/07 the Shrimpers were relegated back to League One & the 2009-2010 season was tougher: a run of just one win in 2010 left Southend deep in trouble, and relegation to League Two was confirmed.

A transfer embargo at the start of the 2012-13 season saw the club start its campaign with a depleted squad. However, a successful loan signing - Britt Assombalonga from Watford - helped Southend to a run of 14 games unbeaten which saw them reach 4th in the table. League form dipped in early 2013. Phil Brown was brought in as manager but picked up just one win in his eight games in charge as Southend finished the season

in 11th position. In 2015 Brown led the team, via a play-off final against Wycombe Wanderers (decided 7:6 on penalties), into League One.

On 22 October 2019, Sol Campbell was appointed manager of Southend. Financial difficulties, including a winding-up petition heard on 22 January 2020, resulted in non-payment of players' and other employees' wages. The winding-up petition was dismissed after debts were cleared.

On 9 June 2020, Football League clubs in Leagues One and Two agreed to end the 2019-20 season; Southend were relegated to League Two. On 30 June 2020, manager Campbell and three assistants left the club by mutual consent.

On 13 August 2020, Southend United appointed Mark Molesley, formerly manager of Weymouth, as their new manager on a three-year contract. On 9 April 2021, Molesley was sacked by Southend United having only won 8 games out of 45. The club were 23rd, five points from safety with six games remaining. Phil Brown returned as manager but could not rescue the situation; Southend suffered a second successive relegation.

On 3 October 2023, the club confirmed that they had reached an agreement for the sale of the club to the Justin Rees consortium and After 15 months, Southend's transfer embargo was lifted on 28 December 2023 game still to play at the end of the 2024-25 season, ending a 21-year spell in the EFL dating from the 2003-04 season. In the 2024/25 season Southend finished in 7th place but missed out on promotion by losing 3-2 to Oldham in the play off final.

6- BEN GOODLIFFE Defence

Joining the Shrimpers on loan from Colchester United until the end of the 2024/25 season, Ben Goodliffe had already racked up more than 200 senior appearances before turning 25 years old. The former Tottenham Hotspur trainee was snapped up by Wolverhampton Wanderers at 18 years old, having made four senior appearances for Boreham Wood. He made 12 appearances for the Under-21s in the Premier League 2, before returning to the Vanarama National League to join Dagenham & Redbridge on loan for the 2018/19 season. After impressing during his stint in Greater London, Goodliffe was snapped up by Sutton United following the expiration of the defender's contract at Molyneux, where he would go on to make 182 appearances in five seasons, earning promotion to the EFL League Two in 2020/21. Following Sutton's relegation to the National League, Goodliffe stayed in the fourth tier as he moved to Colchester, where he made 14 appearances in the first half of the 2024/25 season.

9- ANDY DALLAS Forward

Scottish forward Andy Dallas joined Southend United on loan from Barnsley in August 2025. The 26-year-old boasts an impressive tally of more than 50 goals in the National League after prior stints at Weymouth, Solihull Moors, and Chesterfield. More recently, Dallas has featured on loan for Barrow and Morecambe.

10 - Sam Austin Midfield

Sam Austin joined Southend United after departing Notts County following the 2024/25 season. The midfielder captained Kidderminster Harriers before joining the Magpies in 2022. He led the National League for assists in 2022/23, helping Notts County earn promotion back to the EFL via the play-offs.

14 - TOM HOPPER Forward

Tom Hopper returned to Southend in January 2025, five years on from his first spell at Roots Hall. Hopper first joined Blues in 2018 after three seasons at Scunthorpe United and went on to score seven goals in 14 games, before an ACL injury in the October ended his first season at the club

prematurely. During his second campaign with the club, the striker scored three goals in all competitions before Lincoln City agreed a deal to sign him for an undisclosed fee in January 2020. Hopper spent three years at Lincoln and featured 100 times, including narrowly missing out on promotion to the Championship in 2020/21 with defeat in the League One Play-Off Final. In 2023, Matt Bloomfield signed him for Colchester United to bring him back to Essex and last season Hopper was a regular for the U's making 35 appearances in League Two. He also scored three goals in the final five games, playing a crucial role as they narrowly avoided relegation.

17 - CAV MILEY Midfield

Cav Miley joined the club in the summer of 2022, signing from fellow Vanarama National League side Eastleigh. Miley signed for the Spitfires at the age of 22 from Jersey-based club St Pauls, going on to make 178 league appearances and scoring seven goals from the centre of midfield. Following his move to Essex, Miley immediately established himself in the Blues starting XI upon joining and was named Player of the Year after a magnificent season which saw him appear in every single National League fixture. The midfielder was also awarded with the Goal of the Season following a fine injury time solo strike against Torquay United.

22 - KEENAN APPIAH-FORSON Midfield

On 30 August 2024, we announced the signing of midfielder Keenan Appiah-Forson. The energetic box-to-box player spent eight years at West Ham United, joining Southend United on a two-year deal. He learned his trade in the Hammers' academy before gaining experience in the Vanarama National League in 2023/24 with Dagenham & Redbridge.

30 - COLLIN ANDENG NDI Goalkeeper

Collin Andeng Ndi first signed professional terms with Blues in September 2021 after an initial trial period. He was spotted at South Essex College by club legend Steve Tilson, with his first day on trial at Southend coming in October 2020. The Italian-born shot-stopper's debut for the club came in the FA Trophy against Dorking Wanderers, with his first league appearance coming against Stockport County in April 2022. In 2022/23, Andeng Ndi played 23 league games and kept 13 clean sheets, which saw him win our Young Player of the Season award.

33 - HARRY BOYES Defence

Harry Boyes joined Blues as a free agent in the summer of 2025 after the expiry of his contract with Sheffield United. The left-wing back graduated from the Blades' academy after spending time with Manchester City previously. He's enjoyed loan spells at Solihull Moors, Wycombe Wanderers, Lincoln City, and Fleetwood Town, amassing more than 60 games in the EFL.


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SUPPORTERS CLUB UPDATE BY CHRIS LANE

Following the momentous approval last month of the investment by Nick Semaca, the Stones stand on the cusp of a period of exciting transformation and change. A change that brings hope if a little risk, but something Stones fans have embraced as a necessary step to take the club forward.

As we move away from a fans owned club the Supporters Club's role will be more important than ever, as the Fans Representative, with a mandate to protect the club's culture and heritage.

Programme supremo Mark Hyde and I were delighted to be joined on the Stonescast podcast (available on Spotify @stonescast85) by Supporters Club President Nick Dugard and Chairman Mark Randall. We discussed a range of topics including how the Supporters Club will continue to work alongside the board and ways to engage a growing fanbase, especially younger supporters.

The Supporters Club has a long and proud history - it needs to continue to evolve, but that is only possible if people step up to the plate and support it, both financially and with their time. Our football club is powered by volunteers and even in an era of increasing professionalisation there will be a need for fans to get involved.

I was therefore pleased to be invited along to observe the recent Supporters Club committee meeting and invited (read volunteered!) to write these notes sharing my reflections on what the future of the Club might look like.

My first impression was to observe how dedicated and engaged the Supporters Club members are and how open they are to new ideas. But it is probably also true that the Supporters Club doesn't always shout enough about the great work that they do (especially for the hundreds of newer fans at the Vale) and the outcomes of the finances they raise - including accessible toilets and funds to top up the playing budget. The incredibly successful pre-Wembley fanzones also do a huge amount to promote goodwill and visibility among fans across the country.

There is no getting away from the fact that the Committee members are all over 40 and the average age is much higher. Which means that the Supporters Club needs help with succession planning and to help share the load. We also need to make sure we are representative of the younger fan base and to encourage them to use involvement the Club as a great springboard for their own career development. This is also a great opportunity to make more use of digital channels to reach new audiences.

In an era of a majority owner, the role and focus of the Supporters Club fundraising may pivot and focus more on the supporter experience. This will be especially important as the club navigates a move to the new ground in Hillingdon. Running coaches and making sure there is a great social experience on match days are among many functions that the Supporters Club can fulfil.

The Supporters Club will also be the Fans Representative, subject to potential tweaks to its operating model. At present it is great that we will have continuity on the main club Board which includes a number of long-standing and die hard fans as Directors. But that may not always be the case as the new owner looks to expand and evolve the Board. So the Fans Representative will have a key role to play in scrutinising any fundamental changes the Board might want to make. The exact role and function of the Supporters Trust model is still be decided but they will inevitably benefit from input from fans with accountancy, legal and corporate governance experience. So if you think you have something to offer get in touch with Nick and Mark. They are already taking steps to learn from other clubs and this is an exciting time to get involved.

My instinct is that people need to think about what they can offer and start from there. So if you think you have something to offer, but don't know how, ask the question. You don't necessarily need to be a Committee member and there are lots of ways to make a contribution. Running a coach, supporting an event or helping with the finances and logistics - there are always jobs to do.

I'll finish with the most important question. Are you a member of the Wealdstone FC Supporters Club? If not, and you are reading this you probably should be. If you are not sure check the list of life members on the website or speak to a member of the Committee who will also be wearing QR codes on their hi-vis jackets at upcoming matches. Or consider gifting a membership to friend and family at Christmas! And don't forget the Supporters Club shop either which in person and online has a wide range of Stones related clothing and items.

We may not be a fans owned club for much longer, but supporters will continue to be the lifeblood of the club, offering continuity, passion and identity. The Supporters Club has a crucial role to play. I'm exploring ways to get involved and encourage you to do the same, in whatever way works for you!

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
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

THE GOLA
LEAGUE 1984-85

THIS was undoubtedly the pinnacle for Wealdstone FC... and as winners of the league that unified the cream of the Northern and Southern non-League clubs - and then to become the first to lift the FA Trophy the same season - Brian Hall's side are arguably NL's Greatest Of All Time! MICK FISHMAN fills in the details of an awesome campaign.....

Following its return to the Alliance Premier League in 1982, the club had cemented its position in non-league's top division with 3rd and 4th place finishes.

The team that would now go on to win the Gola League and FA Trophy was largely in place. Bob Iles had succeeded the outstanding Ray Goddard in goal; the defence was the awesome unit of Roy Davies, Dennis Byatt, Paul Bowgett and Steve McCargo, all individually very good and brimming with confidence and experience; while the midfield was largely settled with Brian Greenaway on the right, Gary Donnellan on the left with Robin Wainwright and Lee Holmes in the centre.

Greenaway and Donnellan tracked back to assist the full backs and then broke with pace and purpose. Wainwright, by then in his 30s, still retained his sublime touch and exquisite passing range but had added determi-

nation and a genuine edge. Lee Holmes had been a successful part of the Enfield team that had lifted the FA Trophy the previous year - a nightmare for opposition players with his controlled aggression while he was also a deadly goal poacher, slipping unnoticed into the penalty area to score vital goals. Up front there was the electric pace of Alan Cordice combined with the goal-poaching ability of

Mark Graves.

This team contained no teenagers. It was a set of players chock-full of ability and experience and, most importantly, a winning mentality. The playing style was one that depended on a rock-solid defence supported by a competitive and combative midfield that frustrated opposition attacks, broke them down and launched lightning-quick breakaways, either via wingers Greenaway and Donnellan, or through long balls for the sprinter Alan Cordice to collect. It was a remarkably effective system, made all the more potent by the Gola League having taken the decision to award two points for a home win and three points for an away win. By the end of the season the 12 away wins compared to just eight at home swung the title Wealdstone's way.

It was a squad though and other members played their part: the most intriguing being Andy Graham. Andy was a schoolteacher from Lancashire who had secured a teaching post in the area. He had turned out 'up north' for both Hyde United and Lancaster City but had to await his chance when top scorer Mark Graves sustained an injury.

The collective memory of those who supported the club at the time is that Graham entered the fray and smacked in goals all over the place. In fact, he scored just eight goals... but what influences the memory is the devastating manner in which the goals were scored, and the relative importance of the games in which he scored them. He netted in the FA Trophy 3rd round win against Welling United, the quarter Final win against Frickley Athletic, the semi-final first leg win at Enfield and of course in the FA

Trophy Final at Wembley against Boston United. Most famously, he scored a fabulous volley in the 1-0 win at Kettering Town that clinched the Gola League title.

Few if any of his goals were tap ins. They were either Kettering-style volleys hit on the run from 15 or 20 yards out, or blasted in from a seemingly impossible shooting position with his back to goal. They turned him into an instant Wealdstone legend.

By March and the start of the final run-in, any one of half a dozen teams could have gone on to claim the title. The FA Trophy run had left the Stones behind in their fixtures to the degree that they were left to play FIVE league matches in just EIGHT days! Astonishingly those five games, played almost back-to-back, yielded maximum points. The run alone bore testa-

ment to the talent, fitness, grit and determination of that group of players.

There is no way the claim could be made that the team swept all before them in the league. With a final record of 20 wins, 10 draws, and 12 defeats, scoring 64 and conceding 54 goals, the record was decent without being overly impressive. Nuneaton Borough in second place lost just nine games and scored 85 goals conceding just 53. But the wonderful away record secured the title for the Stones, fully supporting the pragmatic style of play adopted. There were sometimes barely-hidden views offered by opponents (step forward Eddie McCluskey whose Enfield side had beaten us four times in the five meetings that season) that Wealdstone had not deserved to win the title and had only done so by default. Well, there is no doubt that the team did not play football in a purist style; Pele would not have recognised his "beautiful game". But such criticism masks the truth of the great quality of the players forming the squad, their dedication to the task in hand and their ability to carry through a plan to perfection.

At the season's end the club was at the summit of the non-league game. In addition, it had put in an application for planning permission to demolish Lower Mead and on the same site build a 10,000-capacity ground in preparation for Football League status. Could life get any better? Quite simply, no. From these great heights the club was to fall

dramatically from grace and within no time at all become groundless, homeless and playing in a standard far below that which they had been accustomed to. **But what a season!**



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

We've met
you before

It's a shame says Robin, we weren't throbbin' the last time we faced the Shrimpers in the Cup

Saturday November 24, 1979, FA Cup First Round: Wealdstone 0 Southend United 1

We certainly HAVE met Southend before... just two months ago, in fact, when Stones scraped to a 3-2 win over the Shrimpers on an atmospheric night at the Vale.

And of course the programme that day was full of 'Wealdstone v Southend' articles from past meetings.. so should we just trot them out again or go for a new angle? While that course of action was very tempting (this is our 14th programme production of the season, just a dozen weeks in) it seemed better value to seek out some famous faces from the very first meeting of the two sides back in 1979.

Before a 3,100 crowd at Lower Mead, the Alliance Premier League Stones were edged out 1-0 by the then-Third Division Shrimpers thanks to a surprisingly athletic goal from centre-back Alan Walker.

The season before, Southend's FA Cup journey was only halted by European Champions Liverpool in a replay at Anfield, after a goalless draw in the first game at Roots Hall. So their next FA Cup tie was at Lower Mead!

The Shrimpers were struggling a bit though, while the Stones (in the first season of the newly-formed APL, now the National League) were having a good autumn under rookie boss Ken Payne. There was a feeling that this side, who had just beaten Yeovil 5-0 and drawn 4-4 at Bath City, had more than a puncher's chance against Southend.

"We had some talented players in that team" said our midfield maestro Robin Wainwright, who was rightly named man of the match but frustrated



that they only seemed to believe they could disrupt the well-drilled Essex side when the game was pretty much over. "Neil Cordice and Nigel Johnson were our main strikers but I wished we had the use of George Duck that season... he had left the club and signed for Dagenham and I wish I had played with him as he was a goalscoring phenomenon.. and a really smashing bloke too.

"I had played against Wealdstone for Hillingdon Borough and also Bedford, but unfortunately George was going the other way that summer of '79 when I signed".

Stones apparently paid £2,000 for 'Throbbin Robin' while we received £5,000 for the devastating Duck, who had just scored his 250th goal for the club in seven seasons.

The amiable George, who can be found at the Vale bar today in his ambassadorial role, was a youth star at Tottenham before quitting in the (mistaken) belief that he wasn't up to the standard. He then played briefly for Millwall and made one league appearance for Southend.

"I just fancied playing for Wealdstone" said Robin, who is now 74 and living in Bedford.

"I always enjoyed playing at Lower Mead - it was a tight, homely ground with great atmosphere and the

manager Alan Fogarty was an impressive coach. But he was from the Midlands and left to manage Tamworth.. and he was replaced by Ken (Payne) who I knew from my time as a player at Luton Town, my first club. Ken was a goallie who didn't quite make the grade... he left to play and manage in the Herts County League before becoming reserve team manager at Wealdstone, and then was appointed as first team manager.

"He wasn't any great shakes as a coach though."

So what do you recall of the Southend game, Robin?

"Not a lot to be honest, just the disappointment that we failed to perform on the day".

My memories of Robin Wainwright were that we had signed possibly the most influential midfielder outside the Football League. He had always stood out for Hillingdon and had an outstanding debut in the APL as Stones were beaten 2-1 at Southern League champions Worcester City on the opening day. Robin supplied the assist for Neil Cordice's

goal: a sweet pass behind the City defence into Neil's stride, and his trademark explosive finish did the rest. Robin stayed at the Stones for nine years, until we were relegated from the Vauxhall Confer-

ence (as the NL was then known) in May 1988. He started in 450 games across league, cup and the midweek Capital League (plus 19 as sub) while scoring 42 goals.

That's not a bad tally for a defensive midfielder although quite a few of those were penalties. He is particularly remembered for a hat-trick of spot kicks, and one from open play, when we demolished Boston United 7-2 at Lower Mead in 1986!

"One of the reasons I left Hillingdon was because I wasn't a favourite of Boro boss Allen Batsford - he and I did not see eye to eye about how football should be played" said Robin.

"Lo and behold he joined Wealdstone later, and I thought "Oh no!". However, he and I did get on better then, and I respected him as a person. He actually liked me then, I think. I loved to train hard, and he liked that.

"My other main memories were the brilliant Stones fans - I remember travelling a long way to away games and in the double year we played five games in a week with two of those at Altrincham on the Monday night, and two days later away to Gateshead. Unbelievably, the fans were at all of those games. We won every game!

"Of course they had their opinions, and I liked to talk to them in the bar after the games. They didn't hold anything back, but I liked that, even when I didn't play particularly well."

Robin moved on at the end of the 1988 season with our former skipper Paul Bowgett asking him to join him at Baldock Town where he was player-manager. "But I had a nightmare time in my two years there. I had an operation on a broken nose, an operation on my achilles tendon, an operation on a fractured cheekbone, and then then on my first game back after this, I broke two bones in my right leg. I didn't play again. I was 38 at the time, but felt I could have played on if I didn't sustain all these injuries."

In 1991 he became assistant manager at Hitchin

Town, which he did until 1996. In that time they won the Ryman Div I, and had successes in the F.A.Cup beating league sides Hereford United and Bristol Rovers in successive seasons.

Strangely enough, despite winning the FA Trophy at Wembley and collecting all those title medals in the Southern and Gola Leagues, Robin's FA Cup record for the Stones was inauspicious.

In his nine years at the club the first game against Southend was almost a high point. In 1980-81 the Stones lost a 4th Qualifying Round replay to Harlow Town 1-0 and then in 1981-82 came a humiliating 4-1 exit to Harrow Borough at Lower Mead with G.Duck scoring twice.

1982-83 saw a First Round defeat at Fourth Division Swindon Town, 2-0, and although we made it to the Second Round the following year (beating Enfield in a First Round replay) the side collapsed to a 4-0 defeat at Colchester. The 'double' year was marked by a 2-1 giantkilling at Grays Athletic - and although we had a bye to the First Round in 1985-86 it was short-lived as we were drawn at runaway Third Division leaders Reading and lost to a penalty kick.

A better run in 1986-87 saw an eventual exit at Swansea after a 1-1 draw at Lower Mead... but Robin's final appearance in a Wealdstone shirt in the FA Cup came at Midland Leaguers Tamworth in November 1987. It was a terrible way to bow out as we deservedly lost 2-0 to a team nominally four divisions below.

WALKER WRECKS WEALDSTONE

Wealdstone, who were competing in the first round proper for the fifth successive season, never really threatened Southend.

The Stones, playing with enthusiasm and vigour, only came alive in the last five minutes and Nigel Johnson and Robin Wainwright both missed reasonable chances.

Wealdstone skipper John Watson was cautioned in the second half but it was not a dirty game.

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


