Stones blasted in first half

A sad exit

Colchester 4, Wealdstone 0
A DISMAL first-half performance saw Wealdstone bow out of the FA Cup in this second round tie at Fourth Division Colchester.

Their misery started as early as the fourth minute as Colchester took the lead and from then it was all one-way traffic.

The normally sound Stones defence was found wanting as they failed to deal with Colchester's set-piece moves — moves that brought them three of their goals.

The first was a personal tragedy for Stones' keeper Bob Iles. A long throw on the right by Perry Groves was blocked on by Keith Bowen and there seemed no danger as the ball came straight at Iles. But, somehow, the ball evaded the keeper's grasp and squeezed between his legs to settle in the net.

That was the beginning of the end for Stones. Just eight minutes later, Stewart Houston, the former Manchester United defender and now Colchester's player/coach, added the second. Steve Leslie's corner was back-headed by Tony Hadley to Houston, who made no mistake from the edge of the six yard box.

After 22 minutes, Stones found themselves three down. Bowen was left unmarked on the near post to head home a Leslie corner for his second goal of the game.

The Colchester centre-forward, overshadowing his 17-goal striking partner Tony Adcock, completed his hat-trick two minutes from the break to kill off the game as any rest of a contest. Groves went past Gary Donellani and Chris Dibble with a run that took him into the box, before pulling the ball back for Bowen to finish off the move.

The ghost of FA Cup past came back to haunt us at Grimsby

So, the FA Cup dream is over for another year and, as ever, it is bittersweet.

For many of the 400-odd fans who followed the Stones to the Second Round tie at Grimsby, the highlight of the day was the magnificent Platform pub at Cleethorpes train station and its adjacent fish & chip shop.... for by 3.15pm we had shot ourselves in the foot and were 2-0 down. The rest of the game was purgatory.

For those of us, ahem, more mature fans it was all too redolent of December 1983 when the Stones, top of the Alliance Premier League (now the NL) with just one defeat in 14 games, pitched up at struggling League Two side Colchester with a similar, if not larger, expectant following and found ourselves 2-0 down after 12 minutes. It was 3-0 after 22 minutes and then a dismal 4-0 just before the half time break. It's easy to ask 'why don't we learn from this?' but it was 42 years ago! It left us looking enviously at Boreham Wood, handed a much more attractive and winnable home tie against Newport County (and path to the riches and glamour of the Third Round), and re-

flecting that luck plays such a large part every single year.

In the Third Round draw they were again handed a home game with Burton Albion and who's to say they won't make round four? On the flip side you have to look at surprise package Weston Super Mare who must have had an away tie at Grimsby at the very bottom of their 3rd round wish list. Welcome to our world!

All Sam and the boys can do is keep plugging away and ensure that we do a similar job on Cheshunt today when the boot will be on the other foot. The Hertfordshire side are currently 17th in the Isthmian Premier Division having lost their last three away games - shipping three, four and then another three goals - but they did go to Bishops Cleeve in the last round and won on penalties after a 1-1 draw and extra time. The Cheshunt boss, Mel Gwinnett, was Coxy's goalkeeping coach at

Oxford City last season so there will be a real rivalry on the pitch and on the bench today!

The tough run of games continues with the long-haul trips to Truro City next Tuesday night, followed by the equally arduous Sunday afternoon game at Halifax on December 21. The former game was just unlucky after fixture rescheduling, but a 4pm kick off in Yorkshire is ridiculous. It's almost as if DAZN would rather people watched their £100 subscription stream than travel to watch the game live. Talking of which, there is a supporters coach running to the game (£40 adults, under-16s £20) if there is enough demand. See Supporters Club website for details.

We'll be back here to face the formidable Boreham Wood side on Boxing Day, Dec 26 (3pm).

 - Using obscene or bad language likely to cause offence to others • Hitting the side or back panels of the Bulla stand
- 2) No spectator ball games.
- 3) The consumption of alcoholic drinks is permitted INSIDE the social club bar, garden and boardroom areas.
- 4) Vehicles parked on the Grosvenor Vale site are at the owners' risk.
- 5) Wealdstone Football Club supports the FA's campaign on pyrotechnics (e.g. flares and smoke bombs). Any misuse of such items in and around the Ground will result in those responsible being asked to leave the ground and, in line with football authority guidance, may result in a report to the Police, potential prosecution and a ban from the Club of up to three years.

©Elmslie Ender was among the first wave of football club magazines when it replaced 'Long Ball Down the Middle' as the Wealdstone fanzine in the mid-1980s. LBDTM's forerunner 'Wealdstone Whispers' was famously THE very first football fanzine in Britain when it was published in 1971. Another slice of history for our ground-breaking club!

Rod Haider has died. Why has that impacted me? Let me explain.

How often have we heard that expression "it was much better in the old days"? Well, it wasn't. I guess the reason we (and I say we since I am now an old fart) believe that is because, as time moves on, we gradually lose the constants and familiarities that create the backdrop to our lives. As those comfort blankets disappear, we experience a sense of creeping discontent; and that becomes more prevalent as more and more people familiar to us pass on.

That is particularly true of entertainers. No longer will we hear about a new Tom Stoppard play starring Pauline Collins or Maggie Smith. Heaven forbid that Cliff Richard pops his clogs (Fingers would be devastated), but even Cliff, 85, is possibly not immortal.

For us football fans, this feeling of loss is most acute when players leave us. The first great Stones side I saw in action was the 1966 Amateur Cup winning side and I know that at least 5 of them have now gone. John McCormick and Eddie Presland from our wonderful 1970s side have left us. Nigel Johnson, Steve Brinkman and Ray Goddard went far too early. I am so grateful that 4 of our wonderful legends are still with us and attend most home matches - Hughie Lindsay, Charlie Townsend, George Duck and John Morton. I have to pinch myself sometimes that those Stones greats actually can bring themselves to speak to me as an equal (something I can never be). I just hope they are immortal.

So why Rod Haider? He never played for Wealdstone and many of our younger fans may never have heard of him, but back in the 1960s and 1970s he was a non-league football colossus. Following short stints at Wokingham and Woking, Rod enjoyed 5


The death of another football icon throws into contrast the fortunes of our clubs & why we have so much to be grateful for

successful seasons at Kingstonian and by the time he joined Hendon in 1967 had already been capped by England at amateur level 10 times. He went on to make 696 appearances for the Greens in midfield over 12 seasons, scoring 165 goals. He played for Hendon when they were giants of non-league game, winning FA Amateur Cups, Isthmian League titles and scored in that memorable 1-1 FA Cup 3rd round draw at Newcastle Utd. He was a wonderful player.

Rod's passing brings into sharp focus how huge were Hendon back then and how badly they are struggling now. While perusing the Non-League Paper on Sunday I noticed that Hendon had suffered a 1-2 home defeat to Hartley Wintney in the Isthmian league South Central Division in front of a crowd of 209. They currently rest in 16th position in the

league, 3 divisions below us. The lower divisions are riddled with clubs who not too long ago competed at significantly higher levels, some of whom, like Hendon, might be tagged as fallen giants.

But it is not so much those clubs that give me the shivers, it is those who recently were competing in the National League and are on a rapid downward spiral. Take a look at Hayes & Yeading United, Havant & Waterlooville, Weymouth and even Canvey Island. Relegation for them has proved hard to recover from. Unless your club is well funded, relegation from the National League now might prove to be catastrophic.

We have performed brilliantly this season. Less than halfway through and we have amassed over 30 points, in 9th position, just a couple of wins away from a promotion play-off spot.

I, however, continue to look down the table rather than up. To the reasonable and disinterested observer, that would seem ridiculous; but I would suggest is not unreasonable for a Wealdstone fan of long standing. Some clubs that have suffered relegation from the National league are making a decent fist of a bid to be promoted back.

AFC Fylde, Kidderminster Harriers, Dartford, Dorking and Torquay United are all currently in the mix for promotion. Others like Oxford City, Dagenham & Redbridge and Maidenhead United,

less so. The issue for us is that the National league into which we were promoted 5 years ago is no more. It is a far stronger league now than it was then. Likewise, the National League South. I believe around half of the teams competing in the NLS are now full time. Should we suffer relegation we may find it hard to sustain ourselves even in the division below.

It makes me shudder. I have grown used to playing big clubs in mostly impressive stadiums in the National League. I really don't wish to be playing Enfield Town and Farnborough in routine league games and, heaven forbid, hosting Hartley Wintney in a league encounter in 3 or 4 seasons time.

I apologise to those teams if that appears arrogant. We went through all that 30 years ago. A repeat doesn't bear thinking about. I therefore approach every league game with a sense of discomfort. We haven't the resources to recruit a team capable of spanking other clubs in the way York City currently are. Every victory, every point is hard earned. It's not always enjoyable, but it's riveting.


What I can say is that I have fallen in love with this team. I'm not so naïve as to suggest that the players are emotionally committed to the badge. They're just footballers.

But I truly believe they enjoy a sense of togetherness and purpose that allows them to produce performances to match teams constructed with infinitely

better resources. There is a connection between the players and the fans that transcends achievements. This is a team without stars but brimming with heart and no little ability. Dante in goal epitomises this - he continues to pull off outstanding saves at crucial points in many matches. Jack Cook is already a club legend.

Deon Woodman has developed from a sad, dispirited looking young player rejected by Matt Taylor to an outstanding centre half recalled by Neil Gibson and nurtured by Coxy. Connor McAvoiy is simply a gem. Enzo is like the boy who would turn up on the touchline of a game at the local park begging for a game, even if it meant playing in goal. I admit I have been Micah Obiero's second fiercest critic (without mentioning Nick Clark), but I hold up my hands to say that Coxy has helped turn him into a proper forward. I could go on. Each and every player gives everything out there on the pitch and rightly get applauded off at the end of matches.

If and when this team reaches 53 points and certain survival, I shall stop suffering agonies at matches and start to relax and enjoy the games. Should we end up in comfortable mid-table and having enjoyed a decent FA Cup and/or FA Trophy run, this squad of players will be remembered fondly for years to come - and revered for their part in the club's development.



Think of Kenyan footballers and probably the only one who comes to mind is Victor Wanyama - the first player from that African country to score in the UEFA Champions League as he starred in Celtic's shock 2-1 win over Barcelona ten years ago.

But now step forward The Obiero Boys! Micah, here at Wealdstone, and his younger brother Zech (on Orient's books) are following in the footsteps of proud dad Aggrey who played for his country in the early 1990s before coming to live in East London.

"It's a real football family" said 21-year-old Micah when I caught up with him for a chat before the trip to York.

"We are living in Hainault, in Essex now so I'm travelling across to Wealdstone training with Alex Dyer and Malachi Napa. Zech is training at Orient but we also do some Power League in the evenings and dad comes over and joins in - and he's still quite decent!" he laughs.

There is the sound of merriment in the background and dad Aggrey joins in.

"My boys are just like me, both strikers, a lot of pace and play wide" he said. "I come over to watch Micah at Wealdstone and, you know, the football is more like African football, a lot of keeping the ball,

like Brazilian really.... I'm very impressed with the way they play".

I asked Aggrey, now 52, if he played football in this country... he said that there were no restrictions when he arrived from Kenya, but it was very difficult to secure a work permit. Then when he did, around the mid-late 90s he played for a succession of non League clubs like Bromley, Gravesend, Dagenham and Romford.

"But English football was a big shock to the system! It was all 'hit the channels' and 'send it long to the big man up front' ... there wasn't a lot of artistry to please the fans that I was used to, playing in Kenya and Egypt".



Micah says that the Stones' style of football was a big factor in bringing him back to London after two years as a pro at Huddersfield Town. Like 17-year-old Zech, Micah started off at Orient as a 14 year old before he was scouted by championship side

Huddersfield while playing Sunday football.

"It was an awkward time as it was the Covid season, behind closed doors with no crowds. I was playing for the under-23s but then they closed the academy and just had a 'B' team ... the same sort of model that Brentford have.


"But I was doing well. The B team played lots

...but Meeks has been here 3 years!

front-man role this season and the obvious question when we had a long chat last week was: "What's been the inspiration for your performances so far this season?"

"Well, I think I've always put the same level of hard work and energy in, but before we weren't seeing the result of that. It wasn't being translated into goals and wins." he said.

"This season, under Sam we have a shape and a method and a lot of it is confidence, speaking personally. The gaffer has put a lot of trust and

of friendly matches, at home and abroad and we were travelling to play against teams like Bayern Munich, and to Spain and the Czech Republic".

"A great schooling in continental football styles... what was your highlight at that time?" I asked him.

"Well, at the end of that season I scored a hat trick at Hertha Berlin and that helped me make the first team squad for a game at Millwall, though we lost 4-1".

He was then loaned out to a Carlisle United team who were flying along in Div Three. "I was mainly on the bench as the team was doing so well, but I did manage to get my first goal in men's football when I scored at home to Aston Villa in a Papa John's Trophy game".

Micah was away from London but living in club accommodation right next to Brunton Park, Carlisle's ground ... but his next move, in the summer, was a bit less convenient.

"My two-year deal at Huddersfield ran out and a few clubs were interested" explained Micah. "Wealdstone got in touch but I'd already committed to sign for Boston United. And because I didn't drive then it was a long, long train journey up to training and games from Hainault and all the way back again!

"Paul Cox had brought me in, but then he was sacked as manager and Ian Culverhouse

(ex Kings Lynn manager) took over. It was good playing there, a decent new stadium and big crowds but the travelling was terrible and I was so pleased that Wealdstone got back in touch"

Did he know any of the Stones players before signing? "Well only Dom Hutchinson and Mason Barrett, having played against them in under-23s, but come to think of it Tarryn (Aklarakhia) was at the same secondary school as me, Seven Kings in Ilford...but his hair wasn't quite as slick in those days!"

Micah made his debut off the bench in the 2-1 home defeat to Boreham Wood, helping spark a late revival. He missed the FA Cup elimination by Wood (being cup tied while at Boston) but has started the last four games and his driving runs were a feature of the games against Altrincham and Wrexham.

"The Wrexham performance is my highlight so far - I thought we kept the ball really well and that's what the manager wants - Stuart and Matt want us to be brave on the ball and it's great to have that freedom to play".

So what's Micah's favourite position? "Ideally it would be up front, just off the main striker - even as a 10 - but I also enjoy playing wide and even at wing back.... I'm going to play high in that position and threaten the opposition".

He certainly gave Wrexham's highly rated left wing back Callum MacFadzean one of his toughest games of the season as the Welsh side struggled to get any meaningful possession.

Away fans were astonished at how dominant the Stones were in that first half. And they shared possession 50-50 after the break with Micah constantly trying to offer options in his wide role.

"I like to think I can be tricky to defend against, by making smart runs in behind - and I can score goals. I think I'm quite versatile too".

Notts County keeper Sam Slocombe certainly knows he can score goals - beaten by Micah on his near post for a consolation goal in the 6-1 drubbing at the Vale. That was Micah's full home debut but he was much happier at the end of the Wrexham game.

"It was great to hear the fans as we came off the pitch - a record home crowd at the Vale - and they were amazing too at York last week... now we've got to repeat those levels of performance in every game".

confidence in me and we sat down and had an honest chat in pre-season about what he wanted, and what I wanted. We've worked hard in training to get me into the positions to score goals and help the team and it's paid off. Also, I was played in a number of different positions in those first three seasons, including wing-back, so I wasn't able to establish myself in what I see as my best position.

"It has helped, though, that often this season I've been the only fit striker! Sean's had his injury, Daniel his dislocation and Nathan Young-Coombs his hamstring, but that's just football I suppose" he says.

That's being a bit harsh on yourself though, I told him. Micah has been involved in every one of the 25 competitive games this season, starting in almost every game and his goals return of seven makes him the Stones' top goal scorer. The training ground routines and a better understanding with the players is paying dividends.

Micah (pronounced 'Myca' by the way, despite his nickname of 'Meeks') says his favourite goal of the season was the second at Brackley when he cut in from the left and fired his shot into the net of the far post from the edge of the penalty area.

"Although my header at Boston, from Big Phil's cross, was equally

good... It's just that we lost the game which makes it less memorable"

Micah lives in the family home in Hainault, Essex, with his dad Aggrey (a former Kenyan international) and younger brother Zach who is just fighting his way back from injury to figure once again in the Leyton Orient first team squad

"Zach is a very effective player" says Micah, "but he plays in a slightly deeper position to me, the No.8 role. He hasn't scored as many goals though!"

To my mind, Micah started the side off on the eight-games-undefeated run (which ended at Grimsby) when he netted just before halftime against Sutton United at the Vale - when we were in danger of being completely out of contention after falling two goals behind.

His tidy finish from Sak Hasssan's interception and pass gave us belief going into the second half - and of course we won that game 4-2.

"The way we have managed to get something from some really difficult games, often away from home, since then has been really encouraging. If you can capitalise on the home games and avoid defeat away - that's the key" he says.

"When I

first arrived, under Stuart Maynard, we were just starting a run of six consecutive defeats including losing 5-3 at Boreham Wood in the FA Cup, and then the 6-1 defeat by Notts County at home.

"Things are very different now and I think a lot of that is down to the connection with God among many of our players - we have a prayer meeting before every game and it's really helped us to come together as a group. It's that belief that helps us through the bad times and makes us stronger as a collective" he says.

"Even games like against Forest Green Rovers, who were so strong, we managed to get a result by keeping our shape and counter-attacking effectively... that's how my goal came about after Dom had crossed so well from the right. It was really just a tap-in but we worked the position really well and that goal was so important."

Micah will be 25 next February and his ambitions are to

play as high as he possibly can "and then to see what that looks like. We are definitely punching above our weight and this season so far has been so enjoyable... who knows where that mentality can take us?"

"A lot of the boys have belief in God and that has helped us come together as a group"





ALL YOU NEED TO KNOW CHESHUNT FC THE AMBERS



Cheshunt FC was the oldest amateur team in Hertfordshire back in 1931. Then the club disbanded, only to reform the year after the Second World War ended.

A gentlemen's amateur side of the same name preceded the current club. They were formed in 1880 and competed in the Athenian league, having future Spurs Manager Arthur Rowe amongst their numbers, before folding in 1931.

A new Club was formed in 1946, making national headlines only four years later when they knocked holders Bromley out of the Amateur Cup in front of a still-record 5,000 spectators at their newly opened Cheshunt Stadium on Theobalds


Lane. Over the next twenty years the Club switched various leagues before finally emulating their old namesakes and joining the Athenian league in 1964, gaining promotion to the top division under former Spurs and Wales winger Terry Medwin a few years later.

The 1970's saw the arrival of John Drabwell as Manager and during his spells in charge, the London Charity Cup, the Athenian league and Cup double and entry into the Isthmian league were all achieved. In 1978 the Ambers also reached the FA Cup 4th qualifying round for the fourth time, an achievement they have yet to equal or better.

Four years later they were knocked out of the last eight of the FA Vase, the furthest they've gone in any national competition, and also saw the beginning of a young Iain Dowie's career who would go onto great success both as a top flight player, a Northern

Ireland international and eventually as a premier league manager.

Takeovers and withdrawals saw the near collapse of the club in the mid-80's causing them to tumble down into the Spartan league before returning to the Isthmian league six years later.

New Manager Andy Leese took over in 2002 and guided his side to two successive promotions and the top of the Isthmian premier league before his sudden departure and near relegation in 2005 when the club was switched across to the Southern premier league.

Relegation back to the lower Isthmian divisions came after three nail-biting seasons and another frustrating ten years would follow as the Club's new Chairman and owner, Dean Williamson, went through several managers before appointing Craig Edwards in January 2018.

Initially steering his side away from relegation, everything then clicked for Edwards and his team halfway through the following campaign and promotion to the Isthmian Premier league was achieved with victory in the play-off final against Bracknell Town.

With level-three football finally regained and major plans for redevelopment of the ground in hand, things were looking good for the Ambers. However, two seasons of limited opportunities frustrated players & staff alike as the Covid pandemic saw the 19/20 and 20/21 curtailed. Working behind closed doors within health guidelines the club retained most of the squad built for step three, and made a flying start to life in the Isthmian Premiership in the club's 75th Anniversary year.

A fantastic FA trophy run saw the club advance

further than ever before finally going out to Vanarama National League champions Stockport County 1-0 in the 5th round. The Trophy run coincided with a slump in league form and a backlog of fixtures, the Ambers recovered in the latter stages of the season securing a play off place with one game in hand, and winning the Herts FA Senior Cup for the first time. Play off wins, away from home, over Bishop's Stortford & Hornchurch see Cheshunt FC start the 22/23 season at the highest point of the football pyramid achieved in their 75 year history.

Life at step 2 of the pyramid was short-lived after the team didn't recover from a poor start to the season & spent most of the year in and around the relegation places, relegation aside, it was a great experience with the club learning a lot from it on and off the pitch, and having had a taste of National League Football the objective is to do it again. With the fan base growing the stadium has had additional seven step terracing added to both ends of the ground and another 250 seats added to the Sports Bar Stand. The club continues to grow with Walking Football, Inclusive teams, A Women's Team and an ever expanding Youth section all seeing success over recent seasons.

AMBERS to watch



PRESTON EDWARDS *Goalkeeper*

A vastly experienced keeper at the top levels of Non League football, Preston grew up in Cheshunt and returned to his home town club this season as player/assistant manager.

LORDON AKOLBIRE *Defence* A fast and versatile full back who has played on both flanks for Cheshunt, Lordon excels on timing his overlapping runs but also has the energy to get back to fulfil defensive duties, Lordon starts his second spell at Cheshunt having been with the club during the NLS 22/23 season.

DARION FURLONG *Defence*

Darion has footballing DNA being a member of the Furlong family and brings a calming influence to the back line with his assured play and reading of the game, a strong & quick defender, he is a definite threat in the opposition box too.

RAUL DA SILVA *Defence*

Raul returned recently to the Ambers for a second spell having had a season away. A regular in the NLS team his presence in either box is substantial and his aerial presence is a key part of his game.

DEQUANE WILSON BRAITHWAITE *Defence*

A new signing in midfield for the 25/26 season, Gucci is a presence in the middle, a ball winner & creator with experience of step 3 at Bedford Town & Enfield Town.



The WFC champions

PART VII:
NATIONAL LEAGUE
SOUTH, 2019-2020

Welcome to the final episode of this series: Five years ago Stones re-joined non-League's top table after a 32-year absence and MICK FISHMAN looks back on a brilliant, unprecedented campaign due to football and pandemic reasons...

Despite the team just falling short of gaining promotion to the National League in a dramatic play-off semi-final defeat to Woking, Bobby Wilkinson's brief 2-year stint as Wealdstone manager came to an end before the start of the 2019/20 season.

This meant that the club was now searching for a second new manager in 24 months, after enjoying 22 years of Gordon Bartlett's tenancy and a new management team of Dean Brennan and Stuart Maynard was quickly announced. Dean and Stuart had managed Hemel Hempstead Town, establishing the club in the National League South after stints with Glen Tamplin's moneyed circus at Billericay Town and then Kingstonian.

The pair arrived at the club full of enthusiasm and a 'black book' full of players they had on their radar: this was important since the playing staff on their arrival consisted of just Jonathan North, Jerome Okimo, Danny Green and Jake Sheppard. Connor Stevens was quickly secured on a contract before new arrivals were announced. Following a flurry of activity, recruits who would go on to play a major role included defenders Michee Efete from Billericay Town, Nick Arnold from Aldershot Town and Jacob Mendy from Carshalton



Athletic, in midfield Connor Smith (who had played on loan with the Stones in 2012 when a young 18-year-old at Watford) returned along with the young, quick Horns Academy player Dennon Lewis, who had spent much of the previous season in the Scottish Championship with Falkirk.

Three other hugely significant signings were made. Ex-Chelsea Academy player Billy Clifford was signed from Billericay: the

massively talented midfielder had not properly settled at a club since his Chelsea days, but he became arguably the league's most influential midfielder player over the season. Ex-Crystal Palace youngster Michael Phillips also joined from Maidstone United but the stellar signing was centre-forward Ross Lafayette (left) from Billericay. Ross had been with the Stones 10 years earlier as a youngster and after successful spells at Hemel, Welling and Luton Town he was content to

enjoy the autumn of his football career at Grosvenor Vale. His experience, maturity and ability would prove to be massively important.

One issue of concern was the fitness of goalkeeper and club legend, Jonathan North, who was suffering a recurring ankle injury. A specialist's report showed that he would be sidelined for 3 months so Dean and Stuart dipped into their plethora of contacts to secure Aston Oxborough on a 6-month loan from Premier League Norwich.

So, the new era at the club kicked off with a home game against old rivals Dartford on 3rd August and in a terrific display of controlled, attacking football the Stones ran out 4-1 winners. Three days later we went down 1-0 at Dulwich Hamlet but played some scintillating football... by 21st September the team had played 11 league games, winning 10 and losing just that one, scoring 29 goals and conceding 10. This left them top of the league having already amassed 30 points.

The first serious reversal came in the last match of September when title favourites Havant & Waterlooville walked away from the Vale with a 4-1 win. This should have been a jolt to the system but the Stones had been the better side for large parts of the game and Paul Doswell, the vastly experienced Havant manager, said as much.

The winter was shaping up to be the wettest on record and defeats by Hampton and Royston (in the Trophy) set alarm bells ringing. But he next 3 league matches blew away such doubts - a 3-0 win over Concord Rangers, a hard fought 0-0 draw at Bath City and a 2-0 home win over Eastbourne Borough.

Early in the New Year manager Brennan pulled off a

master stroke by signing the mercurial goal poacher Moses Emmanuel - and a 1-0 win over Welling and a magnificent 4-2 away victory at main challengers, Havant & Waterlooville was followed by an astonishing 7-0 demolition of second-placed Bath City (with the best defensive record in the league), a 3-0 home win over Billericay Town and a 3-1 battering of Dorking despite having ten men for over half the match following Connor Smith's dismissal for a rash challenge on an opponent.

The murmurings of a global viral pandemic now became a reality. All football was suspended. Should the season be declared null & void? In the event, happily the National League decided to complete the season using unweighted points per game which resulted in Wealdstone comfortably being crowned National League South Champions.

Stones fans had seen successful teams from the past win cups and championships but was this team as good or even better than any or all of those teams? The most talented and entertaining of Wealdstone team of all time? It's an argument with which I, for one, would agree.

AUTUMN 1975 was a great time to be a Stones fan – the blues were riding high in the table, five points behind joint leaders Wimbledon and Maidstone and with games in hand.

Our first-ever season in the SL Prem (1974-75) had ended with a creditable 8th place and we started this 75-76 campaign like a train. November culminated in our first appearance in the FA Cup 1st round for ten years - an epic 4-3 defeat at Third Division Aldershot - and it was followed by a 7-1 mid-week mauling of Gravesend at Lower Mead. We were going to conquer the world!

A few weeks later, a crowd of 1,214 filed into Lower Mead and were duly rewarded with this victory over mid-table Tonbridge, with George Duck and John Lewis getting our goals and the prolific Phil Stonebridge replying for the Kent side.

But this was effectively the Stones' last hurrah that season... an inexplicable loss of form occurred the following Saturday at Grantham where we lost 3-0, and then our home record went on Boxing Day when eventual-champions Wimbledon won 2-0 at Lower Mead.

The match report (on opposite page) highlights those games as being instrumental in our title hopes... what hopes!! We followed up those defeats with a spineless 4-0 collapse at Telford United, and the misery continued into the New Year. A 1-0 win over Kettering in January was our only success in 19 league games, until a mid-March win against Yeovil! Thank God for the great start, which eventually kept


us up (along with Dunstable's withdrawal from the league) despite finishing 4th from bottom which would normally have meant relegation. Tonbridge's goal difference was marginally worse than ours - which was all that stood between the club and an embarrassing drop through the trap door.

Cost-cutting measures in December can't have helped the mood of the fans or players - Jim Godfrey, reserve keeper Roy Mackenzie and Vince O'Kane were all put on the transfer list even though our first-team squad was only 15 or 16-strong.

Goalkeeper John Morton, whose heroics had much to do with our battle for survival (and that brilliant autumn) is still puzzled by the directors' parsimony. Dynamic winger John Henderson was released after being denied £5 for petrol from his Bedford home, and after manager Eddie Presland was sacked the club shelled out to bring in midlands-based former Nuneaton boss Geoff Coleman and his deputy Alan Fogarty.

A whole raft of expensive players (Kenny Halliday, Danny Light, Barry Dyson etc) were signed and they arguably helped keep us up. Though I'd rather thank Dunstable. One of the cost-cutting measures saw the slim eight-page programme reduced to a wraparound pamphlet with just one page of club news. We wouldn't stand for that now!

'Stones now fifth and just three points behind

Wealdstone 2, Tonbridge 1

WEALDSTONE climbed into fifth place in the Southern League Premier Division with a deserved, if hard earned victory over the strong, robust Kent side at Lower Mead, but it was by no means an easy win.

'Stones are now three points behind leaders Wimbledon, who were engaged in the F.A. Cup, second round, in which they lost 2-0 at home to Brentford.

As all that was going on, the second, third and fourth placed clubs were all doing the Lower Mead lads a good turn by dropping points. Secc played two games more than 'Stones, lost 2-0 at home t

Nuneaton, who are third from the same number of matches, were held to a 1-1 draw by Atherstone and have two more points, and Dunstable lost 2-0 at Gravesend and have played one game more than Wealdstone and are just a point better off.

Only Nuneaton, with 1,478, capped Wealdstone's surprisingly good attendance of 1,214 on a bitterly cold afternoon.

Confidence is great in the Lower Mead dressing room and this, of course, as we near the turn of the season, is the time for the big challenge. Much will depend on the next three games - away to Grantham on Saturday, home to Wimbledon on Boxing Day and away to Telford on December 27.

All are hard fixtures and four points from these three will leave 'Stones very much in with a chance.

With John McCormick unavailable on Saturday, Wealdstone brought in recent signing Sammy McHale, formerly with Guildford, in the number five shirt.

McHale, a big fellow, was understandably a little out of touch with the home side's de-

fensive tactics at times. He did a lot of good work in the air but occasionally gave goalkeeper John Morton palpitations with some of his ground work. He was, one felt, occasionally slow on the turn, but then he is short of match practice.

Paul Fairclough did a good job in covering and sweeping and it was pleasant to see Ginger Fulton back to better form. On his day he is an exciting player and he was very much in the thick of things on Saturday.

EARLY THRILLS

It seems almost silly to report that George Duck missed a penalty - a rare happening. But he did, and that in some part let Tonbridge off the hook, but the big fellow made amends with a fine winning goal, so all was forgiven.

There were plenty of early thrills as Wealdstone powered their way forward with Fulton much to the fore with adventurous runs up the wing. Byrne just missed one fine cross and Duck headed over from a free-kick when Fulton was felled in full flight.

A flurry of attacking gave Hancock a chance for Tonbridge but Morton anticipated cleverly, and again saved the situation when McHale was slow to pass back.

Wealdstone went ahead after 28 minutes. Duck and Byrne

found each other deep in mid-field, Lewis and Henderson played a delightful one-two and Lewis was so accurate with a well weighted shot.

That was all 'Stones had to show for a lot of first half graft, but they should have been two up just after the break.

Duck worked himself into a good position on the left of the box until Cooper floored him. George rose to take the spot-kick but blasted well wide instead of placing in his usual style.

That knocked a little stuffing out of the home side and within a minute Flood had equalised for Tonbridge with the Wealdstone defence less sure than usual.

'Stones went helter-skelter into attack and Brian Hughes, in the Tonbridge goal, had some bad moments as he gave away a string of corners. Cooper kicked off the line and Flood headed a Byrne special past a post.

Then Fulton, who was giving the Tonbridge right-flank a roasting, stormed through once more. His cross was beautifully placed and Duck climbed to majestically head into the net via Hughes' body.

Ambers, We've met you before

55 years ago and this teenager is introduced to clever headlines

Saturday December 5 1970, London Senior Cup First Round: Wealdstone 3 Cheshunt 2

CHESHUNT FC may not appear to have much of a glamorous claim on Wealdstone history but they were there when I first started watching the Stones and they are here at the Vale as we start the wishful Journey to Wembley this afternoon.

My first brush with the then-Athenian Leaguers from North London came at our old Lower Mead ground in December 1970, our last amateur season. It was a London Senior Cup tie, pretty much third in the roster of cups amateur clubs played in in those far-off days. The FA Cup came first, of course (and we always excited before it got interesting) followed by the FA Amateur Cup which we had won - at Wembley - only four years earlier. But all our best players had been poached by then and I remember clanking


The fightback came with two John Ritchie runs. One took him past the slowing Gordon Sedgley (who brought him down for a harmless freekick) and the second had him shooting wide from the edge of the box instead of passing.

Sedgley managed a good tackle on Dave Yerby to halt the next raid and then a clash with Dafford had referee John Morgan cautioning the other ex-Wembley man Fred Pudney. Bobby Bennett, at centre-forward, because, apparently, John Hazell's inability to train regularly because of business calls displeases coach Alan Humphries, tamely hooked a Ritchie pass over the top but on 24 minutes it was one-all.

Ritchie and Johnson burst through together and Johnson, small, fast and game as they come, everything that one had thought John Wilson would have been, slammed a tremendous shot from the right that gave Byrne no chance.

Gigg spooned over the top for Cheshunt before Johnson set off on a long run down the right and a centre that Bennett was painfully slow to reach and Byrne took. Yerby pulled a great save from the keeper when he wriggled through and shot low and unexpectedly for Byrne to grab right on the line.

Cheshunt came back once more and Gary Hand kicked off the line after a Murphy corner. On 34 minutes Olson made amends, forcing himself through to nod Johnson's corner in for 2-1.



Seconds later it was Olson at the other end, flickicking a Pudney shot straight back upfield. Now 37 minutes and still Olson, sending a freekick for a foul on Hand to Johnson for a screamer of a shot that grazed the far post.

Johnson tried one more to end the half, bouncing a drive from a Yerby pass off Ted Marjoram.

Cheshunt levelled ten minutes into the second half with a gift of a goal. The home defence was static as Murphy had only Swain to slip round to tap into the goal.

Gigg, having missed a sitter, collapsed after a Olson tackle and Johnson took over again. Another run on the right had a centre to the far post where Yerby headed narrowly wide. Tempers rose with ten minutes left when Ratty, chasing into the box, seemed to draw his boot over the prostrate Swain. He was again warned — I'd have had him off at once.

All became sweetness and light two minutes later, though Pudney gave away a freekick on the right wing and Tommy Mahon lobbed it into the goal-mouth. The ball bounced back to Hamill, fully 24 yards out on the left of goal, who hit it left-footed through the mob of players into the bottom far corner.

The Harry O report with some Hellzapoppin movie posters from the time

through the turnstiles with my schoolmate Phil pretty high on the excitement of being favourites to win (for once). To be honest, in a different realm things weren't a lot different then to the way things

are now, bearing in mind the disparity of the big 'boot money' clubs like Enfield, Wycombe, Hendon and Sutton compared to the shoestring Stones. Though that is something I love about Wealdstone even now,

the tenacity and drive to overcome overwhelming odds.


So I enjoyed the game, which took us to a second round tie at Tooting & Mitcham played out in miserably foggy and icy conditions early in the New Year. A whole other story about that game and getting lost in the pea-souper which I may bore you about one day.)

But it's remarkable how your mind leaps out of its 60-something skull and blares out crystal-clear memories of an afternoon over half a century ago.

Cheshunt had a right back who was tall and bandy-legged and who was ridiculed by the patrons of the Elmslie Stand, several of whom are still with us today and probably ashamed of themselves (well at least they should be). This gentleman in the amber and black of the visitors was ex-Wealdstone full-back Gordon Sedgley, who had actually played in successive Amateur Cup Finals in the mid-60s - in the Stones' glorious win over Hendon in 1966 and also for Enfield in their 1965 triumph. But he was now decidedly over the hill and it wasn't long before he turned his attentions to following his son Steve's career. Coincidentally, Sedgley Junior, born in 1968 also played at Wembley for two different clubs - for Coventry in the 1987 FA Cup Final and then for Tottenham in 1991. And like his dad he won both.

But back to the game. Apart from the sledging of Sedgley, my main memory came the following Friday when the Harrow Observer dropped onto the doormat. I eagerly turned to the Stones match report of the Cheshunt game and was completely bamboozled by the headline: "Hellzapoppin! It's the Olson and Johnson Show".

Newspaper headlines of the day were normally "Late Gary Hand goal wins the day" or "Fighting Stones through to second round of

they both scored!" I exclaimed. The Harrow Observer had never seemed so exciting!


The headline wasn't in the realms of "Super Cally go ballistic, Celtic are atrocious" or

the London Senior Cup" so what was Hellzapoppin all about?

I asked my Dad. He said: "Ah yes, that's quite clever. You see, there were a couple of comedy actors called Ole Olson and Chic Johnson who starred in a popular film called Hellzapoppin in the 1940s that was basically a parody of American movie-making. Wealdstone also seem to have a couple of players called Olson and Johnson". "Yes! Gerry Olson and Bill Johnson, and

"Swedes 2 Turnips 1" of recent times - or even my own favourite: "A little Norwich is a dangerous thing" after the Canaries were relegated with the shortest back four in the Premier League - but it was hugely creative in local newspaper terms.

The sub-editor who recognised that Hellzapoppin and Olson and Johnson could reflect a Wealdstone cup win over Cheshunt still earns my undiluted admiration.

Ambers, we've played you before

Garner gives Stones the edge

Cheshunt 0 Wealdstone 2

Simon Garner came off the substitutes' bench to help Wealdstone grab two late goals and maximum points against a physical Cheshunt side in a game which saw three players sent off.

Home Keeper Hilton, defender Barry, and Stones' skipper Fergus Moore all got their marching orders as the referee failed to take control after Cheshunt launched into some awful tackles early on.

The first incident saw Barry rip Dennis Greene's shirt, and the niggling continued throughout this unentertaining match.

Wealdstone should have been

awarded a penalty when Mario Celeire, sent clear by Brian Jones, was brought down by keeper Hilton.

Dominic Sterling had to leave the field with a 'dead leg', and was replaced by Lee Walker, who played well in his first league outing of the season, following injury.

Just before the break, a dangerous-looking free-kick from Steve Bircham was headed clear by Wilkie.

In the first minute of the second period, Stones' keeper Darren Bonfield was forced to save well from Cox to keep the visitors on terms.

Cheshunt were reduced to ten men after 61 minutes, when Barry was cautioned for the second time for a foul on Greene, and sent off.

It was hard to see where a goal was coming from. But that all changed when Garner replaced Celeire in the

70th minute and made an immediate impact with a fine cross that was headed narrowly wide by Greene.

Bircham found the target in the 75th minute, but the effort was ruled out for offside.

But Stones' had to wait only a minute for their opening goal. Jones found Greene, who powerful shot was parried by Hilton, and Garner seized on the loose ball and shot home, having been in action for only six minutes!

Seven minutes later, Stones struck again with their best move of the season, and a strong contender for best goal. Bonfield's long clearance found Garner, who hit a glorious 40-yard pass to Greene, whose first-time pass gave Jones the chance to score with a splendid strike.

The game ended on an explosive

note when Hilton wrestled Moore to the ground and started to fight with the Stones skipper.

Referee Feltham sent off the instigator, Hilton, but then also showed the red card to Moore for allegedly elbowing the keeper.

The Stones' supporters were outraged by the decision which means a three-match ban for Moore, who misses the clashes with Canvey Island, Witham and Hungerford.

At least Stones had the satisfaction of returning with three points which keeps them up among the Division Two promotion contenders, while Cheshunt were left without a home win in 14 attempts that have produced only one point!

Striker's knee-jerk reaction to state of pitch leaves the Ambers high and dry in FA Cup

Cheshunt 0, Wealdstone 1. FA Cup, preliminary round.

CHESHUNT were knocked out of their third cup competition in a fortnight on Saturday as they succumbed to an in-form Wealdstone side who had scored 14 goals in their last two games.

The Ambers' hopes of victory in this prestigious event were dashed even before a ball was kicked when striker, Mark Freeman, pulled out of the game because of the state of the Theobalds Lane pitch.

Freeman, who has returned after a lengthy absence because of a serious knee injury, did not want to endanger his path back to full fitness and seeing the hard, bumpy surface, decided to withdraw from the squad.

With defender, John Gurling still absent — no-one seems to know where — manager Kurt Davidson was forced to put on his boots and played a blinder in the centre of the rearguard.

Cheshunt's largest crowd for some time gathered to watch what promised to be an interesting encounter, but were largely disappointed with what they saw.

The play lacked goal-mouth action. Cheshunt's only on-

target shot of the first half being a Kevin Huddy close range effort that cannoned back off the Wealdstone keeper's legs.

The second half was equally devoid of inspiration and with the game drifting slowly towards a goalless draw, the home side relaxed. This was to prove costly as, with just four minutes remaining, the visitors stole the honours.

Cheshunt were on one of their rare visits into

the Wealdstone half, packing everybody into their opponents' penalty area hoping to get a late goal.

But the tactic backfired badly as the visitors' possession and quickly despatched the ball upfield. Only Bruce Reid was on hand for the Ambers and he was out-run as Wealdstone counter-attacked in numbers.

Keeper Richard Eaton was left hopelessly exposed and Troy Birch slotted home with ease to

take his side through to the next round.

With four defeats out of four so far this season, Davidson needs to find a winning combination soon if his side are to get anywhere near fulfilling their pre-season promise.

balds Lane. We were on our way to a second successive promotion (while Cheshunt, sadly, ended adrift at the foot of the table) but it needed a genuine worldie from our talismanic striker Brian Jones to break the deadlock, as described in Graham Smith's match report above.

The inspiration, though, was Simon Garner. The former Blackburn striker, still a legend at Ewood Park despite being ousted by Alan Shearer, had too much class for lower-rung Isthmian defenders despite his dodgy knees. "Garns" was explosive over ten yards, crucial to our Division Three title the previous season and there was a sigh of relief when manager Gordon Bartlett brought him off the bench with 20 minutes remaining. The next 15 minutes are



seared in my memory. Pretty much his first touch provided Dennis Greene with a great headed chance he put wide, then he was involved as Steve Bircham found the net only for Jones to stray offside. Cheshunt were scrambling - not helped by being down to ten men after defender Barry had scythed down Green for a second yellow card - and they eventually cracked just six minutes after Garner's introduction to take the lead. Greene's blast was parried by

keeper Hilton (nicknamed "budget hotel" by the fans) and Garns was there to slot home.

Then came the coup de grace, as they say in the posh programmes. Our goalkeeper, Darren Bonfield launched the ball towards the left touchline, where Garner was lurking and the ex-Championship star controlled the ball on his chest, allowed it one bounce and then arrowed his pass towards the edge of the box where Greene had shaken off his struggling markers.

One touch from his right foot to control the ball was followed by a left footed pass - without the ball touching the ground - into the path of Jonah... and to our surprise the gangly front man (pictured above left) chose to volley first time from the fringe of the box. The Stones fans erupted as Hilton flailed at the shot, which burst over his shoulder into the roof of the net.

Seven goal thriller at Chestnut Avenue

Tuesday February 20 2007, Southern League Premier Division: Wealdstone 5 Cheshunt 2 **THIS most recent meeting between the teams came a year after the two clubs almost 'merged'!**

In the summer of 2005, a jaded Gordon Bartlett decided to invite Andy Leese (the Ambers' boss) to join him as assistant manager which led to a huge exodus of Cheshunt players to our then-groundshare at Northwood. Ross White, Andy Keepence, keeper Russell Ling, Paul Adolphe, Paul Harding, Liam Baptiste and Lee Chappell... some good, some bad but the experiment only lasted until Leese was jettisoned the

next summer. So when the teams met again in the Southern League there was a bit of needle. The first game at Cheshunt ended goalless, worlds apart from this goalfest at Chestnut Avenue witnessed by 225 fans. Dean Papali, Theo Robinson and Chris O'Leary shared the goals with Ambers' fullback Draper seeing red as he gave away a penalty in the second half. We stayed up, just, with Cheshunt in lower mid-table.

ONE of the most bizarre moments in Wealdstone v Cheshunt history came in August 1995 when the clubs were paired in the FA Cup preliminary round. The Theobalds Lane pitch should have been in perfect nick - on August 26th - but the long hot summer and hosepipe ban made for a dry, dusty surface and home striker Mark Freeman decided not to play.... the only other time I've heard something similar was when we first moved into a dilapidated Grosvenor Vale and our mid-field legend Hughie Lindsay declined to play on the uneven surface in a Field of Dreams fund raising friendly. But Hughie was 70 then and perfectly entitled to pull out! Stones won the Cup tie with a Troy Birch goal.
