YOU CANNOT BE SERIOUS, ENFIELD!


Enfield 0 Wembley 0
WEMBLEY extended their unbeaten record over Enfield to five matches following Tuesday's goalless draw. But whether their opponents took this Middlesex Senior Cup tie totally seriously was in doubt as they brought on international goalkeeper Andy Pape as an 80th minute substitute and played him up front! And he didn't look like scoring either, writes Richard Markiewicz.

Wembley dominated the opening half of this quarter final, which was reminiscent of a pre-season friendly. However, they failed to make use of their possession. The nearest they came to scoring was in the 8th minute when Francis Foley's first time shot hit the side netting following Gursel Gulfer's corner. The Lions forced several other corners but

Gulfer's unorthodox kicks created few opportunities and keeper McCutcheon didn't have a shot to save. Enfield's urgency increased after the interval and they opened up Wembley's five man defence on several occasions. Terrific Terry is schools champ

TERRY Mackin won his 8th race of the winter in taking the Harrow Schools senior (under-20) title at Bannister, writes Tony Bush. The 17 year old Weald College student matched strides with Greenhill's Richard Godden before easing to victory in the last few yards.

Laurence Rudge of St Dominics took the bronze medal just ahead of Weald's Colin Brown. Weald's strong squad were untroubled winners of the team title. Steve Jones was a convincing winner of the intermediate (under-17) title, finishing almost half a minute ahead of second placed Andrew Noble. Nower Hill's Stuart Taylor took third spot while Hatch End, with six runners in the first 14, won the team title. Leigh Sandals showed the benefit of his swimming training with a commanding victory in the junior (under-15) event. The Nower Hill youngster won by almost a minute to demonstrate his athletics potential. Newcomer David Williams took the silver medal just ahead of Hatch End's Rod Collis, the youngest runner in the race. Nower Hill took the team award with six runners in the first 17 to finish. The overall standard was the lowest for many years with fewer finishers in all the races. Whitmore Canons and Harrow School did not take part at all and some schools had incomplete teams, particularly in the older age groups. Comeback for Alan in Sutton's cup exit

ANOTHER of Wealdstone's 'double' heroes, Alan Cordice, who quit the game through injury two years ago, made a surprise return on Tuesday night as Stones lost in extra time in this Capital League President's Cup match, writes Graham Smith. Stones took the lead after 11 minutes when Paul Goyette's corner was struck in by Mark Harrison, but Sutton drew level seven minutes later. Newman netting the rebound after Scott had fired again a post. Stones to hold clear the air meeting

'Tell all on move' say supporters

WEALDSTONE chairman Alan Clifton has answered a call by Stones' supporters for an open meeting to discuss the club's proposed move from Lower Mead to Willesden Stadium.

The controversial issue will be debated at an extraordinary general meeting of the club on Monday February 25 - three weeks after a public meeting called by Brent Council which will gauge the feeling of local residents to Wealdstone moving in at Willesden.

The Wealdstone FC Supporters Club said in a statement this week that they realised that the future of the club as far as Lower Mead was concerned was over and they felt that relocation was absolutely vital if the club is to continue. "By reaction from supporters over relocation to Willesden has not met with unanimity. Said Supporters Club secretary Layne Patterson: "Most people are level-headed enough to realise that we've got to move but 50 per cent of supporters are dead opposed to a move to Willesden. "There is also concern about the lack of information. We want to get an open meeting arranged so people can be told face to face exactly what is happening. The only information some people get is

what they read in the papers." The club chairman said he sympathised with the anxieties of supporters. "I'm fully aware of the concern of all our supporters but both myself and the board and trustees are doing their utmost to further the club's future," said Mr Clifton. "In this respect the board and trustees have called an extraordinary general meeting for Monday February 25 and the agenda will be to inform members and shareholders of the progress that the board and trustees have negotiated on the club's behalf in relation to the club's future and relocation, in accordance with resolutions adopted and passed by members and shareholders." On criticism over lack of information available over the proposed move, Mr Clifton said: "In 1989 the annual general meeting gave us a mandate to act on the members and shareholders behalf and this is what we are doing. "I appreciate the thirst for knowledge, and that some members might feel we are being autonomous in making our decisions, but to secure the long term future of the club some negotiations must be carried out in complete confidence. By February 25 we will know if our negotiations have been successful."

Borough hope for another victorious visit to Victoria

VICTORIA Road has proved something of a happy hunting ground for Harrow Borough this season. They won there by 3-1 against Redbridge Forest in the Premier Inter-League Cup and there was an identical scoreline in their League defeat of Forest's landlords, Dagenham. And on Saturday they will be looking for a third success on the East London ground when they take on Redbridge in the League. Missing from the Borough line-up for the game will be defender Colin Payne who sustained a rib injury against Bishops Stortford and also doubtful is Steve Shea who has an ankle injury. Alan Cordice played his first game for Wealdstone in two years in Tuesday's Capital League match at Sutton and he could win a place in Saturday's team to take on Halesowen in the Beazer Homes League. Steve Smart is Stones' only injury doubt. Aldershot have extended the loan period on goalkeeper Dave Coles by another month, but Stones' other keeper, Chris Vagg, has left Lower Mead and rejoined his former club Walton and Hershaw. Also gone are striker Corey Browne, who was released on Monday, and Michael Brown, who has signed for Bromley. Paul Lelliott has a minor problem with a hamstring and is doubtful for Wembley's home game with Met Police - a vital fixture against fellow strugglers that Lions must win to get clear of the relegation zone. Harry Hutchinson has resumed training after a long lay off and could be in contention for a place. Edgware have a tough home game with Ware, who soundly defeated Edgware 3-0 earlier in the season. Minor knocks for Lee Rider and Jim Davey are manager Brian Rider's only injury problems. Kingsbury take on in-form Saffron Walden with whom they shared eight goals earlier in the season. Jason Dale's gashed heel injury had still not healed and he is doubtful while Robbie James is struggling with a groin problem. Although not completely happy with Rayners Lane's performance against Bishops Cleeve, manager Don Durkin is likely to name the same side for the first time this season when they face Abingdon United.

OLD Gaytonians AC continued their push for the Chiltern League Division One title by winning the fourth round fixture at Luton on Saturday. The Harrow club scored 1895 points to defeat defending champions Bracknell by 51 with the other eight clubs trailing. Gayts now have a 300 point cushion over the Berkshire outfit with just one fixture remaining. The youths and boys team won their event by 5 points from Reading despite the absence of five of their top runners at the Hertfordshire Schools Championships. Terry Mackin was in magnificent form, winning the race by more than a minute. Richard Godden also ran well to clinch the runners up spot and move to second place in the overall classification behind Mackin. Steve Jones had his best ever Chiltern League race, placing seventh overall to retain his position as leader of the boys (under-15) category.
