Steve Emmanuel put Boro two up on the hour when he picked up a Colin Payne through ball, rounded the goalkeeper before netting comfortably.

There were few other chances in a game that saw both teams experiment but there was no doubting Boro's superiority. The only black spot was the injury to Mark Adams which is likely

World beaters

Parkfield take international title for the third time

PARKFIELD Youth under 15s won the International Youth Football Festival for the third year in succession, beating Lucas CAV 3-1 in the under 16 boys' final at Northwick Park.

Parkfield finished top of their group and beat Brunswick 1-0 after extra time in the semi-final — Corey Griffith hitting the only goal.

Playing a year out of their depth, Parkfield then destroyed Lucas CAV in the final with goals by Andrew Gee, Roderick Thomas, from the penalty spot, and David Nolan.

Parkfield also reached the under 14s final, where they were beaten 6-1 by Chalkhill Dynamos. Parkfield beat Brunswick 4-1 in their semi-final, while Chalkhill disposed of North paddington 7-0.

The under 12s competition was won by Belmont. They beat Arvensdale 6-1 in their semi-final and then won 4-1 against Camden Catholics in the final.

A total of 58 teams, from all over the world, took part in the tournament, with more than 1,000 youngsters competing.

Tim Stearn, chairman of the organising committee, said the festival was a great success, despite the boycott by five nations.

Teams from America, Canada and China pulled out because of fears of a terrorist threat, while India and Trinidad withdrew amid the call for sanctions against South Africa.

"The festival was a success," said Mr Stearn. "It was just a shame that so many foreign sides withdrew.

"We were totally helpless and that was the most frustrating thing of all. There was nothing we could do about it. We just had to sit back and reorganise the whole thing.

"We thought about cancelling the whole event but decided that would not be right. It was all about youngsters competing against each other and we had to go ahead.

"But we could not have gone ahead without the support of Brent's Mayor Cllr Les Ford. He was a great help throughout the competition."

He added that plans were already being drawn up for

next year's event, which will again be staged at Northwick Park.

Enquiries are already being made to see if Prince Andrew, the new Duke of York, will open next year's festival.

Double delight for Kenton's Greenwell

KENTON Road Club's Barry Greenwell showed himself in great form at the weekend with two sparkling performances.

On Saturday afternoon in the VC Slough 25 mile time trial on the F1 course in Bedfordshire, Greenwell, in only his second ever outing at the distance, clocked a superb personal best time of 57.58 which put him ahead of a number of well-known riders.

On Sunday Greenwell was in action again, this time in the Booker Racing Team's 90-mile circuit of Chinnor Road Race. Showing the confidence that stems from his recent run of excellent results and current form Greenwell was in the thick of the action throughout but proved strong enough in the closing miles, when the distance, wind and hilly nature of the course had con-

siderably depleted the 60 starters, to go with the final breakaway group from which he gained a fine fifth place.

The club's best known rider, Gino Goddard, was in action in Northern France at the weekend and in one of a number of age-related races against riders from all over Europe took an excellent fifth place in his 50-mile event.

On the time trialling scene three of the club's riders were in action in the Essex Roads '50' near Colchester. Fastest of the trio was Roy Coe who clocked an excellent 2.1.12. Team mates Gerry Wallis and Frank Ward clocked 2.6.52 and 2.8.04 respectively.

In the midweek Wembley Phoenix CC '10' on the Watford Bypass, Barry Greenwell was the fastest rider with a useful 23.02.

Other riders in action were Grant Penstone (26.45), Norman Penstone (27.15) and Frank Bailey (30.14).
