**Kingsbury given four goal lesson**

Kingsbury were taught the harsh facts of life of Division One football in Tuesday night's Vauxhall-Opel League visit of Uxbridge. Terry Dyson's men had beaten Uxbridge 3-0 in the recent Charity Cup final, but that counted for nothing now that the league season is underway. Uxbridge completely reversed that scoreline and added another goal for good measure to leave Kingsbury shell-shocked.

Kingsbury were flattened by a three goal burst in a four minute spell early in the second half.

And Ray Brandon — in charge while Dyson is on holiday — conceded: "Take nothing away from Uxbridge, they were given opportunities and took them. They worked harder than we did and got people behind the ball. I felt we started off the second half well, but our concentration went for their second two goals.

"We didn't create many chances and now we have got to sit down and have a little look at what to do".

Uxbridge took the lead after 12 minutes when a corner from Church was flicked on by Dixon for Bobby Eccles to loop a header into the far corner.

Kingsbury keeper McDonough then did well to turn round a fierce drive from Pope three minutes later.

Kingsbury's only real chance came six minutes from half-time when Joe Harley found space on the edge of the box but shot over the bar.

Everything went wrong for Kingsbury nine minutes into the second half. Defender Kevin Hill needed lengthy treatment after falling awkwardly and was eventually stretched to the dressing room with badly damaged knee ligaments.

Kingsbury's concentration wavered, and a mistake by Harley in the 60th minute allowed Church to nip in and guide the ball past McDonough.

A minute later Church made space and found Eccles who slotted home number three.

Within three minutes Uxbridge had made it four. Desmond Dennis was penalised for handball and Roper made no mistake from the penalty spot.

The closest Kingsbury came to a goal was three minutes from time when Paul Shields saw a header deflected onto the bar from a corner.

**Morris—hero then the villain**

PAUL MORRIS was hero turned villain as Harrow Borough drew their local derby with Hayes on Tuesday night.

He struck a magnificent first half goal to give Boro the lead but was at fault when the home side snatched a late equaliser.

His loose pass out of defence in the 74th minute was pounced on by Hayes full back Mark Harrison who rifled the ball past a startled Kenny Lavender from all of 40 yards.

The goal was no surprise as Boro had been penned in their own half for long periods after the interval.

Winger Noel Fletcher was a particular thorn in their side as Hayes fought for an equaliser.

Lavender did well to save from Glenn Hayward, who raced through with the Boro defence appealing for offside, then centre forward Les Ferdinand headed over when it seemed easier to score.

All this was after an opening half in which Boro seemed well in control.

Steve Long shot narrowly wide after eight minutes then saw an effort blocked when hesitation by Hayes stand-in keeper Chris Merison threw his defence into confusion.

At the other end, Ferdinand blazed high over the bar after Lavender had saved at the feet of Bruce Rowe, and then he shot wide after robbing Bobby Dell in midfield.

Morris went close before in the 34th minute he controlled a loose ball and hit it firmly past Merison from well outside the box. It looked like being enough but

his late slip meant Boro had to settle for their second draw in four days.

"It was a typical local derby," said Boro manager Keith Chamberlain.

"I thought we did enough to win, but at the end of the day I would have settled for a draw before the game.

"I felt we were the better side and could have been two up at half-time, but the most important thing is that we made sure we didn't lose after they had equalised.

"We appear to be more disciplined defensively than last season."

**Lions draw first blood**

WEMBLEY picked up their first league victory of the season in an action-packed match against Staines at Vale Farm on Tuesday night.

Four goals were blasted in inside the first 13 minutes and both goals survived further close shaves before Sylvester Williams popped up to head the Lions 69th minute winner.

Wembley got off to a dream start, racing into a two-goal lead in the opening five minutes.

After three minutes, Adrian Smith mis-hit a shot across the six-yard box and Don Lucas was on hand to steer the ball past a wrong-footed Peter Lara with the outside of his boot.

Two minutes later, dangerman Williams went on a mazy run down the left and whipped over a cross which Lance Cadogan forced home.

But Staines struck straight back. In the eighth minute Nigel Hatcher's near post corner was flicked on for Alan Gregory to net at the far post.

And five minutes later Staines were level. Staines broke quickly, Phil Unwin crossed and Alan Myers met the ball on the edge of the area with a drive that flew into the corner of Jeff Fanner's goal.

Peter Kemp then went close to putting Staines in front but was foiled by a fine point-blank save by Fanner.

The Lions tore back into Staines and Cadogan was only just wide with a header from Steve Lucas's inswinging corner.

Then, Smith played a quick free kick to Eamon O'Connor and he brought a five save from

Lara. Five minutes before the break, the final chance of the half fell to Wembley, with Steve Lively clearing off his own line after Lara had failed to cut out another Steve Lucas corner.

Lara's lack of height saw him struggling at most of Lucas's pinpoint corners and it was from his 69th minute kick that the Lions snatched the winner.

Don Lucas flicked the ball on at the near post and Williams was on hand to nod in a simple goal at the far post.

Fanner then came to the Lions rescue, superbly tipping Unwin's close range header for a corner.

The final chances, though, both fell Wembley's way, with Williams and Shodeinde forcing saves from Lara.

Spud Murphy replaced Eamon O'Connor in the 81st minute, to become the new holder of the Lions' appearances record.

Murphy's appearance took his total to 402, beating the record he equalled in the final match of last season.

Lions manager Alan Dafforn was pleased to get the first win under their belts.

"It is always nice to get the first win, particularly as we have played so well in both of our games so far.

"Saturday's performance at Epsom was almost faultless. I was pleased with the way we played tonight, although there are a few things we will be working on.

"We worked hard at our pattern of play, got plenty of good balls into the box and created plenty of chances.

"Having Steve Lucas back in the side helped a lot because he hit his corners with pinpoint accuracy and they had Staines in all sorts of trouble.

"We have lost five senior players from last season but the lads who have come in are looking good. They are all picking it up and there is a very good feeling in the side at the moment."

**Wealdstone face daunting trip**  
WEALDSTONE face the daunting prospect of ending Saturday bottom of the GM Vauxhall Conference — with no points and no goals. Depending on the outcome of last night's (Wednesday's) match at Maidstone, a defeat at Scarborough on Saturday could leave the Stones rock bottom.

Scarborough have splashed out on seven players from the Football League in their bid for automatic promotion, but they got off to an appalling start, beaten 3-0 at Nunceaton on Saturday. They were due to entertain Boston last night.

"They are probably feeling a bit like we do at the moment," said Stones boss Brian Hall. "Their pride will be injured and if they get a doggy result in midweek I will expect them to come out fighting on Saturday. "It is vitally important to get some points as early as possible in this league. We now face two tough games from which we badly need to get the points."

Dennis Byatt (achilles) and Brian Greenaway (back) should both be fit for the trip to Scarborough.

Wealdstone entertain Dagenham on Tuesday.

Harrow Borough will be looking for their first win of the season when they travel to newly promoted Bromley on Saturday.

Lawrence Holmes who did not start the game on Tuesday, is doubtful with a groin strain but Steve Emmanuel is available after completing a two-match ban.

Another bonus for Boro is that Steve Long looks likely to be available more than at first thought after starting a new job. "It's going to be a difficult game. It is their first home match and they will be enthusiastic, but we don't plan to play second fiddle to anyone."

Kingsbury will be looking for their first point of the season — and their first goal — when Staines Town visit Silver Jubilee Park on Saturday.

Kingsbury will be without Andy McCollin who goes on holiday for three weeks this weekend, while Murray is still not back from his summer break.

Kevin Hill is certainly ruled out after being carried off in Tuesday night's match but Stuart Atkins looks likely to be given his first full game.

Atkins, who came on as substitute against Uxbridge, joined Kingsbury from Chalfont St Peter after spells with Enfield, Barnet and Dunstable.

On Tuesday, Kingsbury entertain Harrow Borough in the Ac Delco Cup with the winners

facing a daunting trip to Yeovil.

Wembley entertain big spenders Leytonstone Ilford on Saturday. But Lions boss Alan Dafforn is not too worried about the star names that will be coming to Vale Farm.

John Still has splashed out more than £12,000 on players since rejoining Leytonstone as manager in February, following a spell in charge at Gola League Dartford.

Eamon O'Connor, who took a knock against Staines, is Dafforn's only doubt.
